This year, several friends and I agreed to do a daily Life Journal Reading Plan. We all do the same 20-30 minute reading assignment in 2025, then write a few brief comments in the "Talk It Over" section. Some of the readings are from two of my favorite books, Psalms and Proverbs. These two books are probably my favorites because I have spent more time reading them over the years.

As a young adult, a friend encouraged me to read a chapter of Proverbs each day. The beginning of Proverbs has some tremendous promises: "... for attaining wisdom and discipline; for understanding words of insight; for acquiring a disciplined and prudent life, doing what is right and just and fair ..." Looking back, this was excellent preparation for applying the Rotary 4-Way Test! Since there are 31 chapters in Proverbs, it was natural to read the chapter for that day (Chapter 11 on May 11th, for example). During 1981-1994, when I lived in Gresham and worked in downtown Portland, I would frequently read a chapter each morning while commuting on the Tri-Met express bus or MAX light rail train. About that time, I learned that Proverbs had also been a favorite book of my maternal grandfather, John Henry Pauly (1884-1971). This picture from our upstairs wall is not my grandfather, but it makes me think of him.



Another friend in those young-adult years encouraged me to read five chapters of Psalms each day, especially when going through difficult times. Over the years, as my work responsibilities and job pressures increased, Psalms became even more meaningful. The daily pattern was similar to Proverbs: start with the psalm of the day (Psalm 11 on May 11th, for example), then 30 psalms later (Psalm 41), then 30 psalms later (Psalm 71) and so on (Psalms 101, 131). The only exception was to save Psalm 119, the longest psalm, for the 31st day (for example, May 31st). Using this pattern, I was able to read through Psalms in most months.

Back to my Life Journal Reading Plan, this was my "Talk It Over" comment on May 9, 2025: The older I get, the more meaningful this becomes:

"In you, Lord, I have taken refuge; let me never be put to shame. In your righteousness, rescue me and deliver me; turn your ear to me and save me.

Be my rock of refuge, to which I can always go; give the command to save me, for you are my rock and my fortress.

... Do not cast me away when I am old; do not forsake me when my strength is gone.

... As for me, I will always have hope; I will praise you more and more.

.... Even when I am old and gray, do not forsake me, my God, till I declare your power to the next

There can often be assumptions made that could not be further from the truth. Rodeo queens are the bridge between the rodeo and the community. They are educators, ambassadors, and are friendly faces to all. The sport of rodeo can often be intimidating. Rodeo queens are there to be approachable and comfortable to ask questions about rodeo and learn new things! Rodeo queens are also representatives of their select sponsors. This consists of them sharing their sponsor on social media, advertising, wearing their clothing/items, and encouraging people to use their service! They are also largely ambassadors for the western way of life, agriculture, and, of course, rodeo. Brief Bio of Presenter: Katie Kilcullen is the 18-year-old daughter of Kristie Kilcullen, WC Grover, and the late Chris Kilcullen. She resides in the small town of Elmira, west of Eugene, an hour away from her beloved Oregon coast. She attends Elmira High School and is nearing the end of her senior year. After graduation, Katie plans on attending Oregon State University, where she will study biology to reach her goal of becoming a veterinarian. Katie began taking horseback riding lessons at the age of 11 and has never looked back! However, unlike most queens, Katie did not embark on her rodeo queen career until the age of 16; her first and only title was the 2024 Miss Philomath Frolic & Rodeo Queen. Katie is a varsity athlete on her high school equestrian team where she competes with her horse Seven in working rancher classes, drill, pole bending, cow sorting, individual flags, saddle seat, and in-hand trail. However, their FAVORITE things to do are to make run-ins at rodeos and enjoy a good trail expedition. Katie only has one horse; she calls him her "unicorn". As Katie rose to the prestigious title of Miss Teen Rodeo Oregon, she plans to dedicate her year to Miss Rodeo Oregon's motto, "Educate, Elevate, and Inspire". She also plans on sharing her platform, "Beauty from Ashes", where she shares the tragic loss of her father and how she found beauty from the unthinkable. She will also share others' stories and how they apply to her platform. As she travels the state of Oregon, she plans on making endless friends, encouraging others, teaching about the great sport of rodeo, agriculture, and the western way of life, all while hoping to brighten someone's day. The role of a rodeo queen is to be the bridge between the rodeo and the community, and Katie plans to be just that.

Greeter - Wear the greeter badge (which is in the badge box) in addition to your own name badge. Place the "door stop" under the door to keep it ajar. In nice weather stand outside. In inclement weather stand just inside the door where it is warm. Greet everyone with a "Welcome to Springfield Rotary" smile. Note the names of guests and visiting Rotarians on the clipboard as they come in. Ask each guest for his or her business card and place it on the clipboard (for possible future members). Please have guests write their names on and wear a Rotary guest name tag. After the inspiration, the president will ask you to introduce each visiting Rotarian. 
