





Peggy Murphy was inducted into the Rotary Club of Southwest Eureka. Peggy was introduced and inducted by Liz Ennis, who was also her sponsor. Liz shared that she met Peggy six years ago through work. Liz explained the many things that Rotary is and welcomed her to the best club in the universe! She was presented with her Rotary "Stuff," her Red Badge, and she passed President Pesch's "test" to join. Welcome, Peggy! She is the fourth new member of the club this year.



Maggie Kraft thanked those who had donated to the disaster relief effort for those affected by the recent earthquakes in our area, which hit Rio Dell especially hard. She encouraged continued support of the effort, as many people are still out of their homes, and many were tenants with nowhere else to go. She talked about going down and helping with cleanup following the event, and that there may be additional cleanup assistance needed. Many displaced residents have been living in hotels around the area, with the County assisting week by week. Many of those displaced are elderly. This is extremely tough on those displaced, as they did not know how long the County would continue to support lodging, and where they would go from there. Maggie shared that many of the tenants could be out of their homes or apartments for quite some time as repairs are made. If you have property or rentals empty and available, please let her know.



A big check was presented by President Pesch, Jeff Pauli and Amanda Moxon to Sorrell Leaf Healing Center in the amount of \$27,324. Beth Anderson and her team accepted. Beth thanked both clubs for their collaboration on this very beneficial community project. Sorrell Leaf Healing Center is located off Indianola Road and is planned to open in December 2024. It will provide services and focus on children and adolescents ages 7 through 18, offering transformative, compassionate, evidence-based and trauma-informed care for young people experiencing a mental health crisis in Humboldt and surrounding counties. The club held a tribute to longtime member Les Merrill who passed away in November 2022 at the age of 79. Les was honored with a slide show and mourning bands on member badges, and a photo of Les with a yellow rose and candle sat in his honor at the front table. Les joined the Rotary Club of Southwest Eureka on December 1, 1983. Les was remembered by many as always being there and helping with everything. Scott Pesch spoke of Les always sitting at the far-left table in the back, and he and Larry Goldberg often sat with Les. He was always the first to tap out at the start of the year, and was always involved with club events, especially those involving cooking, like the Fish Feed and the Crab Feed. Larry Goldberg shared that he had sat at the table with Les for at least 10 years. He said that although Les didn't share a lot in those short lunches, Les loved his hunting and fishing trips. Larry echoed that Les was always there working and offered a toast to Les. Greg Dale spoke of when he and his family used to camp at the lake, and a guy camped down the road noticed Greg's Rotary sticker and asked if Greg knew Les. The guy said that he had worked for Les, and Les was a great guy who had really set him up for the future. Greg said that his daughter had been injured, and they had to take her to the hospital. When they returned to the lake, the gentleman that spoke so highly of Les had taken their boat out of the water and got their camp ready for them to go home. Greg said that it turns out that the gentleman was at that time the president of Mission Linen, and Les had been a huge influence in that man's life. As Greg said, Les was pure gold, and one of God's human beings. John Ennis shared a story that Les had told him about cutting firewood. Les had gone out to cut a load of firewood by himself, and while working had passed out. John asked Les what he did when he woke up, and Les said "he drank some water and finished loading his wood." Les was tough! Ken Singleton talked of Les and his participation in club activities, and echoed Les always being there, and that he will be missed. Scott shared a story from Cindy Denbo about the Vampire Halloween Ball where attendees were dressed up in costumes. It didn't strike her that would be the type of event that would draw Les. It surprised her, and others, when Les showed up in a full Vampire themed Tuxedo, black with red lining. He showed up in style, and again was always there! Time was getting very short in our meeting, and I was busy trying to capture the notes, but a memory I didn't share of Les involved the annual Fish Feed. Les RAN the kitchen fish prep and fry crew. HE RAN IT!!! If you have helped in that hot environment over the fryer cooking bottom fish and calamari or assisted with the grill cooking petrale sole (That was his baby, to be sure it was cooked just right), you know! Les was a true lesson in the term "Service Above Self."

The closing thought from President Pesch was from Theodore Roosevelt and dedicated to Les Merrill: *"It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid soles who neither know victory nor defeat."* Meeting adjourned. 
