Our program today was provided by the CEO of Providence St. Joseph Hospital and Providence Redwood Memorial Hospital, Darian Harris. He was appointed to this position in the fall of last year. As the largest provider of a level 3 trauma center on the north coast, he notes that the needs of the local community are growing. Just last year, St. Joseph Hospital saw 35,000 emergency room visits while Redwood Memorial Hospital saw 14,000 visits demonstrating an upward trend in demand.

With a primary mission of enhancing timely access to care in this area, Providence looks to enhance the work force by creating pathways to make it easier to get into healthcare. They highlight a key collaboration with both Cal Poly Humboldt and the College of the Redwoods to develop a pipeline for the future.

Noting the significant needs in the behavioral health infrastructure, Providence is also collaborating in the development of a Crisis Treatment Center that has 3 million in funding from a state grant. This center would allow for the chronically unsheltered to recover off the street.

Providence sees recruitment and retention of providers as a key element to enhancing access as well. Acknowledging they have an exceptional first level, they hope to use a "grow our own" philosophy to build depth of providers. They also note that to be able to provide world class care in a rural setting, "who you recruit" is a vital foundation to retain providers. They believe this community does provide a great selling point for potential candidates.

Going forward, Providence believes that the focus should largely be on the people and that may require shifting their philanthropy strategy to do so.
