


Woodland Sunrise Wake Up Call

Charity Navigator has awarded The Rotary Foundation their highest scores and their highest ratings for the past 10 years. TRF has scored 100 out of 100 in the categories of �Overall Score and Rating, � Financial, � and �Accountability and Transparency. � A 5 star rating in all categories! Only 1% of reviewed charities have received consecutive 100% ratings for the past 10 years.

It is because of our Charity Navigator ranking and credibility that the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation decided to partner with Rotary on the Polio Plus Program and other initiatives.

What We Do: Rotary members believe that we have a shared responsibility to take action on our world **\$** s



Our 35,000+ clubs work together on our **Six Areas of Focus:** Promote peace; Fight disease and help with vaccination and disease control; Provide clean water, sanitation, and hygiene; Save mothers and children through maternal and child health support; Support education and promote literacy; Grow local economies through microcredit loans



What ever Rotary is to us, it is known to the world by the things it achieves. Because of Rotarians, the world is a better place.

When you join Rotary, we ask that you contribute \$100 a year to The Rotary Foundation. When you give money to the Foundation, that money goes to the TRF and is invested and half of it is sent back to our district and clubs to use for global and district grants for projects locally and around the world. The other half is used by TRF to support the many global projects that Rotarians take part in around the world.

Polio Plus: Past President, Young Professionals Member- Keith Rode The Global Polio Eradication Initiative was created in 1988, just after



theWorld Health Assembly resolved to eradicate the disease poliomyelitis by the year 2000. It was described by the World Health Organization as the largest public health initiative in history. The Initiative is spearheaded by the following Organizations: WHO (World Health Organization) who are responsible for planning, technical direction, surveillance and eradication certification. Rotary International whose responsibilities include fundraising, advocacy, and volunteer recruitment. The CDC who are in charge of deploying scientists and public health experts to WHO and UNICEF. UNICEF is in charge of the

distribution of the vaccine and helping countries develop communication and awareness strategies. The Gates Foundation as well provided a large portion of the funding. Key tactics used by the GPEI include strengthening childhood immunization through oral vaccines, conducting surveillance through investigation of acute flaccid paralysis cases among children under 15 years old (in order to determine areas where the virus is truly eradicated), and

conducting "mopup" campaigns in areas where cases of polio have been identified. It has over 20 million volunteers. 200 core countries are involved. Over 2.5 billion children have been vaccinated.Our Goal is a polio free world! Since 1988 when Polio was still found in most of the world over in 125



countries and over 350,000 cases, it has now been confined to three countries, Pakistan, Afghanistan, and Nigeria. It was eradicated from the Americas in 1994. You have to be polio free for 3 years to be certified polio free. To date this year there has only been two cases in Pakistan, one case in Afghanistan and no cases in Nigeria, which has been polio free the last two years and needs three full years free to be removed from the endemic list. Costs an average of \$3 to vaccinate a child. Every dollar donated by a Rotarian is matched 2 to 1 by the Gates Foundation.

Only two diseases have ever been eradicated globally, the first is Small Pox and the second is Rinderpest (a cattle disease). Polio will soon be the third disease eradicated.

Our club members alone have donated over \$8,800 to Rotary s Polio Plus campaign in the past five years.

International Project HELPS Guatemala - Past President Ellen Burriss

Ellen has traveled several times to Guatemala with medical mission groups

to perform medical services to areas in need in Guatemala. 18 years ago she joined Rotary and another member asked if she would join their work group. She was a bit reluctant due to the location and concerns about travel to this poor country. She agreed to go on a medical mission on one of HELPS first trips to the country and it changed her life.



On that trip she made friends with local Rotarians. She has found Rotarians in every country she has visited and it is a powerful connection. Her 19th trip starts on Saturday. They visit areas that are still living in such poverty. This year there are 90 volunteers and they bring everything they need to create a temporary hospital. Last year 1500 people were waiting when they arrived. They perform over 300 surgeries in this time. They do a week of surgery and dental work. They also help fit people for prosthetic devices. They help set up some preventive care programs. The volunteers pay for their own expenses. Our club has repeatedly funded the purchase of vitamins and over the counter medications like Tylenol to use in the hospital and deliver to orphanages the group visits annually. Over the years some family members of Rotarians have joined her, including Gary Wright, his wife Pat and Greg Stille. It all started with joining Rotary.

WSRF and the Salmon BBQ - Our Club Treasurer, the District Treasurer and Youth Exchange Treasurer - Lynn Jepsen

We have a different theme each year and they have included such fun times



as The Summer of Love, A Safari, A Night at the Circus, Sports themes, and this year will be a Mardi Gras theme. Total funds raised by Salmon BBQ over the years: \$620,000. The first year we gave out \$6600 in grants. Now we give out roughly \$25,000 each year to BBQ recipients. We have awarded a total of \$591,000 in commuity grants.

Recent Recipients: Empower Yolo, Veterans' Resource Center, Woodland Swim Team, Woodland Library,

Woodland Police Activities League, Woodland Parent Nursery School. Over 100 different organizations and a total of 160 grants have been awarded. **Our recipients this year** will be *Yolo Employment Services* and *NorCal Trykers*.

We have a Watts Family Scholarship and a Tom Vail Endowment as part of our Foundation. Our goal is to grow the corpus to \$1 million so that we can use the interest to give more to the community every year. WSRF has an operating expense of 3.7%...an A+ rating.

Local Service Projects: Past President, Past Assistant District Governor, Julia Larson

The Woodland Holiday Parade is put on by the Woodland Chamber

ofCommerce on the second Saturday in December. It is one of the biggest holiday parades in Northern California. This year will be the 55th year of this fun holiday tradition that brings the entire community together to celebrate our heritage spanning several generations. Despite being in December, the parade has only been canceled three times due to rain. It brings in over 25,000 people to watch the floats and entrants march



from one end of Main Street to the other. There are usually about 150 entrants ranging from local youth groups, antique autos and agriculture vehicles, non-profits and our Hispanic cultural Charro groups, which are always a crowd favorite with their dancing horses. Our club has been in charge of marshaling the parade for many years. The Chamber relies on our team of volunteers to show up at 7 AM and stage the parade entrants. We gather at the starting line of the parade and spend the next three hours getting the entrants in line and helping people to find their groups. We need 20-25 volunteers to make this event run smoothly. Due to increasing needs for public safety and security, our job has become a bit more challenging as we manage a gateway onto the parade route to restrict only the parade entrants into the line up area. This is truly one of my favorite days of community service. Not only do we get to see all the parade entrants when they are fresh and ready to head down Main Street, but we are part of a team that works like a well oiled machine whose sole purpose is to spread holiday cheer! We also get to wear cool vests and now that we have our own Woodland Sunrise Rotary Vests, I can t wait for this years' parade!

Rotarians at Work: Other Service Projects

We have picked Zinnias from a local farm to give to senior living communities.

We foster literacy through local reading programs. We have volunteers read to 2nd and 3rd grader is an elementary school throughout the school year and books are donated to that school's library for the year. We rotate schools through our community each year.

We support Woodland Kids Read in partnership with United Way. This is an

event for 1st graders in Woodland. The students gather at the Woodland Community College to hear a local children's author speak and then read in small groups. Then each student gets a bag with a book with their name in it to take home.

We help plant trees in our community with the Woodland Tree Foundation. We have planted numerous trees in parks, neighborhoods and the



Fairgrounds.

We help construct school garden areas.

We host and participate in local blood drives.

We recently participated in Career Day at Lee Middle School.

We help maintain an area of the Woodland Cemetery in partnership with Luna Vista Rotary.

We support the local foster youth through Christmas gifts and by giving the kids that are aging out of the system as they turn 18 each year a large duffle bag filled with life essential items.
