PROGRAM â€" MOSQUITO CONTROL MATTERS, Luz Maria Robles,
Public Information Officer. Bob Pye introduced Ms. Robles: Luz Maria
Robles is the Public Information Officer for the Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito and
Vector Control District. Luz Maria is the main point of contact for the general
media and serves as a spokesperson for the District. As a PIO, her main duties
include coordinating media stories, developing successful advertising and
public education campaigns, coordinating and participating in interviews,
creating educational materials and engaging in community outreach, which
involves events, presentations and working with schools. Prior to her work at the
District, Luz Maria worked as a Marketing Specialist for the California
Department of Public Health developing osteoporosis prevention campaigns for
Latino women in California. Luz Maria has a background in television and radio
news and holds a dual Bachelor of Arts degree in Communications and Spanish
from the University of California, Davis. She grew up in Winters.

FIGHT THE BITE –

current issues and challenges related to Mosquito Control â€" show of hands. Who has seen the current campaign? Yep, most of the group. **Mission** â€" Created in 1946 to protect residents from mosquitoes and the diseases they carry. It would be nice to go outside without

harassment. Yearly challenges differ depending on the conditions. Many species come out at different times of year and act differently. Ag does produce a lot of mosquitoes.

SEASON – In Woodland and the valley, mosquitoes are year-round. The high season is April to October, with most during June, July & August.

BREEDING â€" Water is where the immature states incubate. Egg to Mosquito

can occur in 4 – 7 days. Our breath is an attractant, the CO2 we exhale.

BACKYARD

Mosquito sources â€" any standing water. Neglected pools can produce 1 million mosquitoes over



the course of a summer – these are a big target for the district.

PREVENTION?

Mosquito fish are a good solution which you can get from the district. The fish eat the larvae. On ponds can you put oil to prevent breeding? Yes, if it's there constantly.



INTEGRATED

MOSQUITO MANAGEMENT METHODS:

Public information and advertising – getting the word out. 40 events and many outreach activities are part of the annual campaign.

DATA – Their laboratory tracks and monitors trends for knowing where to spray and take action.

ECOLOGICAL MANAGEMENT - Fisheries – fish help control pests naturally. They have locations where the fish are grown, and they have 24 ponds in Elk Grove – as pictured – that are then taken for free to any location requested. Also, they work with property owners and help to reduce water sources that might be habitat to eliminate mosquitoes. Better to modify the environment than to use pesticides.



CONTROL OPERATIONS â€" They are in charge of inspections and monitoring corrective actions. Recommendations are made for improvement of conditions. Large scale operations include aerial spraying, too.

WHY? West Nile Virus is the most prevalent disease, but there are also Dengue, Malaria, Chikungunya, etc. 80% are asymptomatic contraction of the

disease. 1 in 100 people may have severe symptoms and die. The map indicates a high prevalence of West Nile in our region. In 2023 there was a record amount of rain that led to many mosquito breeding sources. In addition, there was a significant increase in the number of rice acres planted within our district area. These factors, in combination with hot temperatures during the summer, led to a long and intense West Nile virus season that resulted in a sharp increase in human cases. In Sacramento County there were 53 human cases confirmed, while Yolo County had 39. This is a huge upsurge compared to 2022 when there were 5 and 3 cases respectively. Statewide, there were 428 human cases, including 19 fatalities. West Nile virus activity was also detected in 636 mosquito samples and 258 birds. At the peak of West Nile virus in August, an elevated amount of WNV activity resulted in urban aerial spraying to decrease mosquito populations, posing a public health threat in the cities of Davis and Woodland. This year, there have already been cases reported in Woodland. Cases, when confirmed, usually aren't noticed and diagnosed until later in the Fall. Current data shows a reduction by 60% from the reports last year. It is here to stay â€" hopefully it can be reduced.



NEW CONCERNS –

New invasive mosquitoes and diseases include more local transmission of foreign diseases. Travel related cases are not uncommon, but now there are cases of people who haven't traveled overseas. Some of these new mosquitoes are



aggressive day-biters. Their migrant patterns are small and localized; they

don't fly very well. They have already been seen in Woodland, Davis, Winters and Sacramento County. Winters has the most.

RECOMMENDATIONS regarding invasive mosquitoes – look for stagnant water. Be thorough; they can breed in minute amounts. Containers may hold the eggs in a dormant state. It is recommended to scrub them. Transport can cause spread.

Some can breed in mud, most need actual water. Lynn Jepsen â€" do different parts of the country have different species? She would be bitten in Minnesota with no problem, but here in California the reaction is much worse. A: Yes, the types of species can cause different reactions. Not age related.
