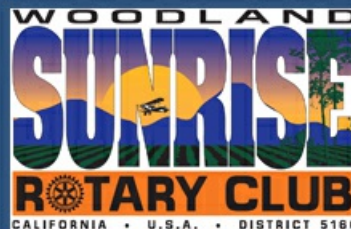

TYPES of Foliage: Veggie, orchard, native. The type she is obsessed with is ornamental gardening. We often don't think about foliage. Showing some photos that were lacking color in gardens, Ms. Santos said that we need to know the rules prior to breaking them while planting.

COLOR, TEXTURE & FORM of Foliage: Green, Red, Blue, Yellow: 4 main foliage colors to use in the Garden.

Green Foliage is the easiest: Star Jasmine is her favorite because it is a semi-evergreen that keeps its leaves all year long.

Red Foliage: Red tip Photinia: Super great plant in our area.

Blue Foliage: Lamb's Ear, or Helen Von Stein, is her go-to for blue.

Yellow Foliage: Breath of Heaven & Sunset Gold. Doesn't care so much for our water in this area. Shining and smells super nice; deer resistant.



TEXTURES: There are 3 Main Textures:

Fine Foliage: Such as Red fountain grass. **Medium**

Foliage: Salvia like the Mystic Spires Blue, and **Bold**

Foliage: Hosta.



SHAPES: There are three main forms: **Vertical, Mounding, and Prostrate. Examples:**

Verticals are North Pole Arborvitae trees.

Mounding: Artemisia or Silver Mound, and

Prostrate Form. Give a Low line like the Green Mound Juniper.

Is there something missing in your garden? Look for colors, textures, and forms to make a balanced garden.



Questions:

John Beatty: Are you able to monetize what you do? Yes, she retired from healthcare and now is very successful with sponsorship.

little round pellets for fertilizer.

Keith Rode: Mater Gardener program: What exactly is it? The program is to encourage the community to garden and how to talk to the community about what they know and have learned about gardening. There is a lot of training, which includes a 12-week program along with volunteer hours and continuing education. This is a great opportunity to put what you learned right back into your own home. Where do you buy plants? Ace, Home Depot. Morning Sun herb farm in Vacaville, run by Rose, Lameria Nursery in Dixon for shrubs, and trees. Green Acres in Sac is, putting it in her own words, Disneyland, for her. Red Barn Nursery was one of the first to do podcasts on gardening.

Larry Petersen: We have a Ionicera shrub in our yard, and it has gone dead. What may have killed it? Most likely, earwigs and slugs will kill your plants. You need Sluggo around your plants. Make a barrier around, and not right next to your plants. This works best.

Val Robinson from State Farm 530-661-6666: (Jim will have to pay a fine for me posting his phone number next week). She asked about online with a Master Gardener, plant sale through the Arboretum in Davis. Being a new gardener is a class for beginners. This class works for all who are interested.

John Roncoroni: Tomatoes and mulch are all you need, you say mulch, mulch, mulch. Why? Mulch is just so important to keeping the ground moist.

Val Robinson: Again, chiming in: we used to mulch like crazy on the East Coast. Why is mulching so important? A: Water retention for droughts. Chipdrop.com is a great source for wood chips which are fantastic to use for mulching.

Bruce Watts: Did a chip drop and now has a lifetime
