PROGRAM â€" INTRODUCTION TO FALCONRY with DON HILDEBRANDT AND PETE MARTIN [not pictured below.]





KEVIN SANCHEZ introduced our speakers, Don Hildebrandt, and Pete Martin, who will present **CALIFORNIA HAWKING CLUB – Introduction to Falconry** [btw, thanks for leaving your small mice and voles at home this morning, said Kevin]. [Pete Martin is on the left, Don Hildrebrandt is on the right.]





Don Hildebrandt is a Master Falconer and has practiced the sport of falconry in CA for over 14 years. He is a member of the California Hawking Club and has been a director of the club since 2016. As a director of the club, Don participates on the CA Hunting & Conservation Coalition Committee working with other members assisting California Fish and Wildlife with regulations. He also participates in various club educational and informative programs and falconry workshops. Don helps the club at their annual event, managing its open house for the public and assisting with field activities. He currently flies three Harris Hawks and assists each year with mentoring new Apprentices as they begin their journey to becoming falconers.

Pete Martin is a Master Falconer and has practiced the sport of falconry in CA for over 11 years. He is a member of the California Hawking Club and has been a director of the club since 2015. As a director of the club, Pete also participates on the CA Hunting & Conservation Coalition Committee. He also participates in various club educational and informative programs and falconry workshops. Currently Pete is training 3 apprentice falconers. Pete and Don are active hunters that try to take their birds out hunting every other day during the falconry hunting season.



Don Hildebrandt began by telling us that he is happy to visit Woodland Sunrise Rotary and talk about Falconry. "Good to see all of you!†Don & Pete said that they have a no charge raffle, tickets will be passed round, and the prize is a framed photo of a falcon to take home, if you are interested.

What is falconry? Falconry is the ancient art

taking game in its natural state with a bird of prey. The practice of falconry has evolved over time to be more associated with conservation, cultural heritage and social engagement within and amongst communities. Raptors used for falconry include hawks, falcons, eagles and, to a lesser degree, Owls.

How old is the tradition of falconry? The art of falconry can be traced back to 1700 BC in the far east and was a tool used to put food on the table. It reached the British Isles in 860 AD. Today it's a pastime practiced as a field sport in many countries. Falconers consider falconry as providing a connection to the past.



Raptors. Common types of Raptors: Falcons-Long pointed wings, black eyes and toothed beak; Buteos-Short round wings, short tail, like to soar; and Accipiters-Short round wings, long tail, and fast wing beat. What is the difference between a hawk and a falcon? Answer: Hawks prey on the ground (or close to it) and falcons prey in the air using the classic "stoop†or dive. Each bird type has physical attributes which are aligned for success.



Acquiring Birds. There are a variety of ways raptors may be acquired. Some are trapped in the wild, while others may be bred in captivity. The captive bred birds can be identified by the gold bands on their legs which are placed at the time of hatching, and are registered with the government. Also, many falconers will work with rehab facilities to help condition and train injured and or annual hatched raptors displaced

from the nest. Manv. when they are ready. are successfully released back to the

wild.





Falconers go through a lengthy training program. Falconers usually use a bird familiar to the predator seeking game in the local area. **Robyn Drivon** volunteered a hunting ground, i.e. nature area, for the rabbits out near Wild Wings. Sometimes falconers use a dog to help flush the prey and retrieve it later. Hunting can be time-intensive. Falconry as a hobby or interest can evolve into a lifestyle. They do work with UC Davis for their rabbit population.

Survival. Birds in the wild have a tough time. Up to 80% of first year birds (passage birds) do not live to see their 1st birthday! They may not be successful at hunting, catch diseases or loose some of their hunting territory. Others suffer electrocution, or are eaten by other predators. Falconers create a positive impact because passage birds trapped by a falconer generally live longer when released back into the wild. A typical passage falconry bird is vaccinated, wormed, fed well, housed and learns to identify different (larger) prey options. So when it is released, it has survived its most difficult year (first year) and is healthier when it joins the wild raptor population.



Training Length. It depends. It takes time to imprint to the falconer. Successful hunting is a process of rewards and adaptation to their environment. When they learn dependence upon you for food, they will be less inclined to fly away. It is always possible.

Falconry Services. Abatement – Uses birds of prey to drive pest species from a particular area -- wineries, airports and landfills. Rehab – re-condition/train displaced raptors (fall from the nest or minor injury) with the intent of releasing them back into the wild. Education – Use in instructional applications, schools and raptor facilities -- usually birds that cannot be released back into the wild. Agriculture facilities, including UC Davis, utilize falcons for pest removal-agricultural facilities-jackrabbits-pigeons.






Risks to Falconry? Loss of habitat and game – every year, falconers lose prime hunting fields and our game population lose their habitat to development. Increasing regulatory requirements and expense, with any regulated hunting activity non participants just lack understanding of it or don't like it all together. Fewer young people taking up the sport – as the younger generations become further removed from our hunting roots, there is less exposure to and interest in our sport. That is why education events and school outreach are critical to our survival. Falconers are the ultimate conservationists because often Falconers, as most hunters, are the primary driving force behind conservation efforts in the US.



How to Help? Join the CHC – we have many non-falconry members who simply enjoy hawking with us, attending our meets, and supporting the causes. Support pro-hunting regulation and habitat maintenance and conservation activities. Join your local Ducks Unlimited, California Waterfowl, or other habitat conservation group and help maintain and develop habitat for the game species that we love. And, finally, donate \$\$ to help keep falconry a viable sport in CA.

Pictures of Birds. You can see that the birds have equipment on their legs: bells, telemetry (gps), and a third item. Bird's eyesight is 8 times better than ours – they can see prey and go for it beyond where you can contemplate.



Questions?

Rick Pomeroy – Are there limited hunting times? Yes, the hunting seasons follow the game hunting regulations – jack rabbit season is all year long, cotton tail has a season; but they have been given an extension from July to March (guns are October to January). Pheasant also has an extended period.

John Smythe – as a duck hunter who waits in a blind, how do you hunt ducks with hawks? Typically, they like to be near a water feature. The hawk goes above the pond, the ducks come off the pond and the hawk comes down and gets a duck. **Kevin Sanchez** - Were falcons used to intercept military used carrier homing

pigeons? Yes. There is a book about that. Germans had a program featuring rewards.

Phil Marler – Wild Wings has rabbits and pigeons; how do you avoid small dogs or cats? Over time the bird's success is "wed†to a certain game animal. Hopefully, they will be less inclined to take something else, though the occasional skunk or raccoon is attempted. Pete Martin's got a raccoon when she was young.

Larry Peterson – 200 mph in the decline to catch prey, do they get injured? They can. They stun the prey or rake it with their claws as they swoop down.

Lynn Jepsen – You could charge a fee to Wild Wings and generate some revenue

John Beatty – You can come get pigeons whenever you like. They will talk. A. Every type of prey may not work. Ground Squirrels are nasty creatures and not good hawking candidates.

John Martin – can you hunt at night? Sometimes they do abatement in warehouses. Hunting is illegal at night, but abatement can be conducted at night. Wood rats can be hunted.

John Ronconi – Saw a documentary about the toy company Whammo. The inventors were trying to launch meat balls for falcons because they wanted to be falconers. Instead, they ended up being toy manufacturers.

Jack Rabbits weigh 5- 6 lbs, whereas the hawk weighs about 2 lbs. They have evolved a hunting method to take down and "dispatch†prey efficiently in spite of the weight differences. The hawks also hunt cooperatively.

Pete Martin introduced Ziva a Harris Hawk, weighs about 2 lbs. They train and treat them through the summer and then start hunting in the fall/winter. Her younger brother is Shooter – they are at higher weight during the summer molting season. During hunting season, they get weighed twice a day. They hunt a day, get a good meal, no eating the next day, then go out the next day. A merlin hawk hunter friend goes out twice a day, every day during hunting season. The lifespan can be 20 or 30 years. He knew a hunter whose bird lived 35 years.

Ken Price – Do falconers use Swenson Hawks? No longer endangered, not good for falconry.

John Beatty – sleep on your bed? You would not want that. He has scars from her talons on his arms. Their talons can slice meat and are used for â€~dispatching things.'

Rick Pomeroy – will you keep them for their lives? He hopes to breed her and possibly will transfer her to another hunter if he is no longer able to hunt her. A flight chamber in their yards allows for flying and exercising. Many falcons are tethered to a perch unless they are hunting.

Kevin Sanchez – female or male better hunters. Depends. Dad hunts while chicks are being raised. Males are faster and more maneuverable. They do work on a big jack rabbit together in groups. Often 2 females and a male make a good hunting group. Rabbits learn to head into a bush. The females learn to go around the bush and get them exiting around the back.

Don explained that it is productive and more fun to work in groups of 3 or 4 hawks. The birds have different personalities. Don & Pete have birds that get along, another part of knowing what to expect and what will happen. They have hunted with other less-socialized hawks that work less efficiently together.

John Martin – are they protective, including other hawks? Could be. During nesting season, it can happen. Why is there a limit on cotton tails?



Ellen Burriss – Do you each have more than one bird? Yes.

Phil Marler – UC Davis, GO AGS, was named number 1 in the country for their veterinary school. Do you take your birds there? Yes. There is a bird specialist in Roseville, too. They have some medications that they generally can self-treat.

Rick Pomeroy â€" Do all the birds have a flyway together? Ziva has her own. Several pairs of Don's are together, but chambers usually are separated. **Pete Martin** â€" If you visit him, he can show you stuff from his camera views on the birds, if you would like to come check it out any time.
