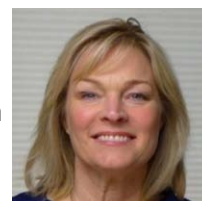

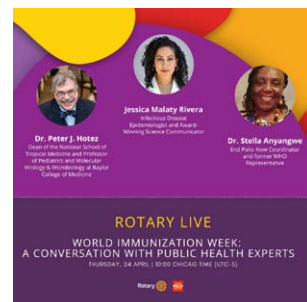


What Do You Say? On

In Memorial: Former Rotarian and City Council Member Mary Wainwright

At our April 23 club meeting, we heard memorial tributes and observed a minute of silence for former City Councilmember Mary Wainwright, whose death had been announced earlier that week in the media. Fellow Councilmember Fred Collignon reviewed her priorities for public safety, infrastructure, affordable housing and youth programs while on the Council and her extensive work in her church and with neighborhood organizations in south and west Berkeley. She gave important voice and leadership to the needs of the Black community and the poor.

Over her years in Rotary, Mary was the sponsor of annual grants for the city's pre-high school football programs and for swimming lessons targeted to underserved youth. She was a founder and longtime Board member of Berkeley Youth Alternatives (BYA), and sponsored many club grants for that program in its early years. Berkeley Boosters, the program founded by Rotary at the request of the Police Department, and its director, the late Rotarian Ovie Wittstock, wrote a successful federal grant which procured a building for the Berkeley Boosters and BYA, where BYA continues to run programs. Mary had been ill and incapacitated in her last years, so recent members never got a chance to work with and know her personally. Click [HERE](#) if you would like to view her obituary.

Dr. Monica Gandhi, MD, MPH, and Doctor of Infectious Disease at UCSF (among her many other credentials), spoke from her office at UCSF. Her report on the impact of U.S. federal policies and funding cuts on health organizations here and around the world, and on the fight against infectious diseases,

Action to Make the World a Better Place

What can a Rotarian do in these troubling times?

Why . . . write to friends and relatives, encouraging them to join Rotary. Below is a letter I sent out, but you are welcome to crib and copy any parts of it that inspire you, my Rotarian friends, to write to your friends.

Helena

Dear friends,

I join with everyone who feels a particular urgency about the state of affairs we now confront. I also know that we must be looking long term too. So, it was good to know that the League of Women Voters is engaged in the Hands Off action on April 5. Talk about long term.

Let me add another important group, perhaps a surprising one. A couple of years ago I became a member of the Rotary club where I live, having long had my eye on the organization because of its commitment to world peace and the deep peace in its explicit ethical stance, the Four Way Test, its mantra guiding over 1 million members in 200 countries: (1) Is it the truth? (2) Is it fair to all concerned? (3) Will it build goodwill and better friendships? (4) Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

There's no "partisan" politics in Rotary, but we sure do public issues. Rotary leads in the global polio vaccination project. One of our seven key purposes is "empowering women and children." We are out front on the environment too. And there are locally run clubs in all the hot spots . . . Ukraine, Panama, Greenland, Taiwan, Jerusalem, and East Jerusalem. My Rotary district will play host this coming year to a high school youth exchange student from Taiwan, and will support her in whatever future comes along during 2025-26.

Most important of all, Rotary is a bottom-up organization. The action really does center on local clubs, each of which does its version of good works and public service. They've been doing it for over 100 years and are planning to be around for the foreseeable future.

In our urgent times, if you are also looking to join a community of people committed to making ours a better, more truth-filled world, consider Rotary.
