

Author Jill Hedgecock was invited to be todayâ \in TMs program speaker by fellow author **Michael Barrington.** Jill writes monthly articles for the Gazette. Not just a writer, Jill is a global traveler, a painter, a poet and author of several novels. She can speak with authority on a number of topics. Or as Michael would say, Jill brings â \in cea full bag of tricksâ \in to todayâ \in TMs gathering. She spoke to us about the plight of the worldâ \in TMs rhinos and how devastating this is.



The author of *Rhino In The Room*, is the story of vanishing wildlife happening on our watch.
