Dave Litty introduced a former exchange student from ten years ago hosted by our club; **Avishai Tepper** and his girlfriend **Laura Maguire.**


Marilyn McClaskey introduced **Pablo Benvente**, who is checking out our club and is currently running for city council.

Nick Virgallito, in his new role as the club Polio Warrior, updated us on this year's polio stats. 16 new cases of wild polio in Pakistan and 18 in Afghanistan. These are the last 2 countries where the wild poliovirus is still active and much work is being done to finish off this disease from the planet - Rotary's number one health goal. There are some vaccine-derived polio cases

showing up in Gaza due to the war. Once again, Rotary and the World Health Organization have gotten two combatants to agree to stop fighting for three days so they can deliver 650,000 vaccines.



TODAY'S PROGRAM:

Michael Barrington and Mike McConnel gave us an update on our Gambia Rising project. This is the project where we helped build housing for teachers in a remote area of Gambia. In the past, the housing was so bad that the teachers who were obligated to teach for one year in these poor areas left after one year. Now that decent housing has been supplied for them, they are staying and education for girls has improved. Before, most girls were "married off" for a dowry as soon as menstruation occurred. There is a

great need to improve the literacy of Gambia, all for the obvious reasons. Getting teachers to stay and create continuity and keeping girls in school longer is a huge help to the local community.

Project cost: \$17,500

Houses built: Five houses (rooms) where two teachers can share a room, lock up their items, and more importantly, be safe.



For this project, all proceeds went to building the houses, as there were no paid staff. The Gambians made the bricks and blocks, and we paid for the other materials



and not the three "R's.

needed. Both Mike's have been on site and in contact to make sure the project is successful.

In Gambia, these schools are run by the Catholics, but most students are Muslim. These schools are important as the alternative is to learn at madrassas, or Muslim schools. While this area does not practice extreme forms of Islam, if the schools are only madrassas, it is primarily a religious education

New Grant: We applied for and received a Rotary District grant of \$12,500, which will be matched by our funds and other area Rotary clubs' funds, for a total budget of \$25,000 for our next project. This will go towards new housing and furthering the education of girls in this remote area of Gambia.

Rick Ernst reminded everybody that we will be at the John Muir Concord Campus this coming Friday, 9/13, for lunch and a program by speaker Mike Thomas, CEO. You must sign up as space is limited to 75. We are over 50, so let Rick know if you plan on attending. Remember to bring your ID and come early as parking is not always convenient.
