League of Women Voters



The League is a nonpartisan, grassroots organization working to protect and expand voting rights and ensure everyone is represented in our democracy. They empower voters and defend democracy through **advocacy**, **education**, and **litigation**, at the local, state, and national levels.

The League was formed in 1920 after the passage of women's suffrage and has kept the name even though men are welcome. Their goal is to have an informed citizenry. On the 2024 ballot there are 10 initiatives. The last five of (32, 33, 34, 35, 36) are what is referred to as 'initiative statutes.' They are put on the ballot by collecting signatures. In California, about 600,000 signatures are needed to have these measures qualify to be placed on the ballot. These are the most complicated and controversial measures and are being proposed by people who have special interests and/or who want something to change. The League recommends that voters read the voter information pamphlet that is far more informative than the screen images you'll see on your home TV. These guides provide all that is needed to make an informed vote after considering the following:

- what is it that wants to be changed?
- what is the current situation?
- what is the fiscal effect?
- what do supporters say?
- what do the opponents say?

Note: Our limited meeting time, in addition to having experienced technical issues with their data file, did not enable us to review all the initiative statutes. This also restricted time made available for Q&A. The speaker informed us that further information about the proposed initiatives may be found on the League's website.

Presentation of District Grant:



Our ongoing commitment to Rotary's International Service projects was clearly demonstrated as Gambia Rising's managing trustee, Mike McConnell, was presented a \$25,000 District Grant check. Funds will be utilized for much-needed renovation of buildings and apartments in the upcountry area of the Gambia to be occupied by the teachers at their schools. Thanks to the DV-8 clubs who collaborated to make this district grant become reality.

Before concluding our meeting today, Elisabeth Andreason was handed the mic to share this


brief, but a amazing Rotary experience during her recent visit to the British Isles. Seems that, on arriving at the gorgeous Scottish border town of Peebles, Elisabeth discovered the local **Rotary** club had their weekly dinner meeting on the very day she was in town. So, she certainly knew where she would be having dinner that evening. (Turns out there were four lady Rotarians in the club, all named Elisabeth). She also learned that one of the Rotary families is the largest potato grower in Scotland, and the second-largest potato farmer in Ukraine. So, everyone in Scotland knows who he is. Their Rotary club is also known for its sizable donation of restored vehicles that are driven by volunteers, and as convoys, into Ukraine. These vehicles are then available for rescue by residents throughout



the beleaguered country. No small project for the Scots, they have just delivered their 500th vehicle! The vehicles are filled with vital supplies when driven into Ukraine. Equally amazing, while at that Rotary dinner meeting, Elisabeth texted Alan Ichikawa, of the MAP organization, which ships large quantities of medical supplies to countries in need. And so...... Thanks to the Rotary connection and Elisabeth's intervention last week, here is yet another real-time experience in which Rotary provides vital support for where it's needed around the world. Wow!


Elisabeth concluded her amazing story with these three words. I LOVE ROTARY.


Our meeting concluded at 1:35pm with the traditional ringing of the bell on this beautiful fall day.




• 1721 Tsar Peter the Great titles himself "Emperor of All Russia"




• 1836 Sam Houston inaugurated as 1st elected President of the Republic of Texas

• 1934 Notorious bank robber Charles "Pretty Boy" Floyd is shot and killed by FBI agents in East Liverpool, Ohio






