Last Week's Meeting Highlights

President Diane once again led us with her signature style, and we were treated to a flavorful lunch courtesy of a guest caterer — delicious curry chicken, rice, and salad that hit the spot!



Our program was presented by Sheryl Morasco and Teddy Muln from the Center for Elders' Independence (CEI) — and what an eye-opening presentation it was! They introduced us to PACE (Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly), a truly innovative approach to senior care that's been changing lives since 1982.

CEI serves 1,300 seniors annually through 5 (soon to be 8!) centers — including one right in Concord — with a dedicated staff of 450 professionals.

Since its founding, CEI has supported over 7,000 participants. Nationwide, there are 180 PACE organizations operating more than 300 centers in 33 states, collectively serving 81,000 seniors, whose average age is 76.

PACE combines both medical and social services to help seniors stay in their homes as long as possible, rather than move into nursing facilities. It's a lifeline for those dealing with chronic conditions like vascular disease, diabetes, congestive heart failure, COPD, dementia, and other cognitive challenges — with nearly 45% of participants facing some level of cognitive decline.

These services are fully covered for eligible participants through Medicare and Medicaid. To qualify, individuals must be 55 or older, living in the community, and certified as needing skilled nursing-level care — essentially, they are those who might otherwise have no choice but to enter a nursing home.

This was a powerful reminder of how community-based care models like PACE are providing dignity, support, and independence to our aging population. A big thank-you to Sheryl and Teddy for the work they do—and for sharing it with us!



COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION

PDG Kathy Suvia had the honor of representing District 5160 at Rotary's 2025 **Council on Legislation (COL) in Chicago**, April 13–17, alongside nearly 480 delegates from around the world. This inspiring event, held every three years, is where Rotary shapes its future by debating and voting on major policy changes.

As RI President Stephanie Urchick said, "This Council represents the heart of Rotary's democratic process... a powerful expression of multiculturalism."

The COL voted on 78 proposals, with many important changes coming July 1, 2025. A few highlights:

- New clubs can now be chartered with 15 members instead of 20
- RI dues will increase slightly starting in 2026 to help sustain essential services
 - District Conferences are now optional, not required
 - Some added duties for District Governors (which our DGs already do!)
 - The RI Board can now remove a member for serious misconduct
