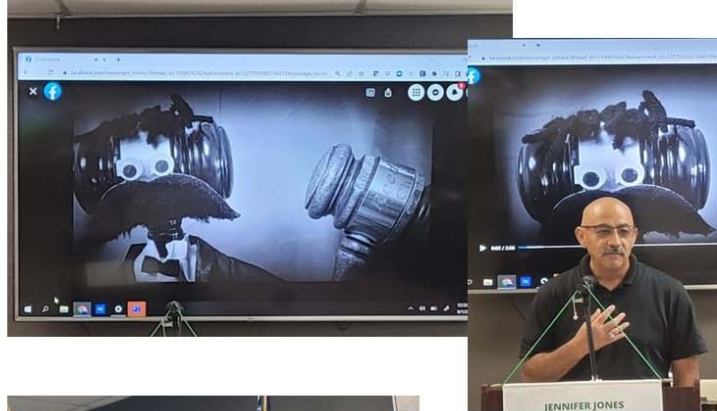

The guest for the day was Mike Leonardo, CEO of the Fresno County Transportation Authority. The Authority oversees all aspects of the distribution of Measure C funds. Measure C was originally passed by voters in 1986 to help leverage State and federal funds to build much-needed highways like the 41 and 168. Measure C was renewed in 2006 and was used for Highway 180, 33, and a host of other highway improvements, along with street and road improvements, bike and pedestrian facility improvements, and other transportation related items in Fresno County and each of the 15 cities in the County. Measure C is up for renewal again. This time the focus will be on neighborhood streets and roads. The Measure is expected to generate approximately \$6.8 billion over a 30-year timeframe.

Bob is a product of Southern California, the Burbank area specifically, and moved to Washington when he was young.
