Third, Rotary International welcomes a new president, Jennifer E. Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada. She is the first woman to hold that office in the organization's 115-year history. And, President Jennifer has already announced the new theme for the 2022-2023 Rotary year! It is "Imagine Rotary".

"Imagine, a world that deserves our best, where we get up each day knowing that we can make a difference."

The theme is a special one: the theme graphic was designed by an Australian Indigenous artist to link with the Melbourne Convention in 2023.

The symbolism includes:

- Circle connections to one another
- · Dots around it our people
- There are 7 Dots for Rotary's 7 areas of focus
- Circle + dots around it a navigation star, our guiding light
- Green solid line digging stick (used when doing hard work); for us it's People of Action, represents the tools for getting things done
- The colours purple, green & white celebrate diversity, equity and inclusion
- Freedom to express ourselves differently but still with a special connection
- Purple is also the colour of Rotary's Polio campaign
- Green represents the Environment
- White stands for peace; it also represents Empowerment and Newness

Rotary's Areas of Focus

Monday's Fresno Bee had a front page story titled "How Fresno County Plans to Spend COVID Money". The focus of what was written in the first column covered water and youth issues. So what popped into my mind? Rotary's Areas of Focus! There are seven areas and two of them are "Water" and "Youth".

Water, Sanitation & Hygiene

We support local solutions to bring clean water, sanitation, and hygiene to more people every day. We don't just build wells and walk away. We share our expertise with community leaders and educators to make sure our projects succeed long-term.

Basic Education & Literacy

More than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. Our goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy.

Water was on my mind specifically because Sanger was recently experiencing low water pressure issues. Before the pandemic hit, our club briefly talked about the Tombstone territory (near Sanger) and it's water problems. The city of Sanger currently has a project working for the Tombstone problem.

And Basic Education & Literacy? Sanger Rotary has a huge interest in the children. Just think about the Dictionary Project.

I could go on (and on) but before I know it, it'll be time to get ready for Rotary! We might explore more Rotary Areas of Focus in future stories.
