

Kings River Conservancy

The mission of the Kings River Conservancy is to foster community involvement in protecting and enhancing environmental values, to enhance and control public access for recreation, to educate the public on matters related to environmental values, to preserve agricultural lands and to encourage sound public conservation practices along the Kings River corridor from Pine Flat Dam to Highway 99.



During the club meeting this past Friday Tammy Eggert led a discussion about the programs at the Kings River Conservancy and various activities that are available to the public. I was really interested in the KRC Raptor Walk. Having lived in the city most of the time, it's only recently I've noticed the beauty of the raptors I see around Sanger and the river. The KRC Raptor Walk

follows the south shore of the Kings River just below the dam. It's a flat, casual walk (but not completely smooth) with interpretive signs describing the large birds of prey you are likely to encounter along the trail.

If you weren't at the meeting you missed a lot of great information. You'll need to visit their website to find more, or better yet, visit the KRC! There was so much information presented that, President Adela had little time to get all the club business in . . . but she made it!

There are three links on top and two on the second line. On top you have:

- **My Rotary:** My Rotary is a place for members of Rotary to access tools and information to make your membership experience better. If you haven't visited "My Rotary" before you'll need to create an account the first time. You must maintain your own login information. Club officers can't see or change your login items.
- **District 5230:** This is the district website. If you want to know what is going on in our district, this is where you want to go. There is a "Member Login" link at the top. . . use your DACdb login!
- **DACdb Login:** The District maintains a database of all the Rotarains in the district. You can login and maintain or modify your personal information (i.e. enter a new phone number or email address). You may need to login to the DACdb if you desire to register for an upcoming district event. There is a "Member Login" link at the top. . . use your DACdb login! You can't login? Send Dennis an email and he will resolve your issue.

The second line contains an "f" and a Member Login link.

- The "f" will take you to Sanger Rotary's GROUP Facebook page. The Group page is currently "private" (you need to request to join) but may change to public in the future. Once you join, you can post items if desired.
- The Member Login link requires your DACdb login, but keeps you on the club website. You only need to login if you are looking for secure documents (i.e. Club Treasurer's report).

Polio Update


Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a

role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort. Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

According to the Los Angeles Times this past week, New York city has recorded it's first case of Polio since 2013. The person suffered paralysis which is permanent. Since then the polio virus has been found in the wastewater of two counties in the area where the patient lived, but also in New



York City.

It makes you wonder if "anti-vax" individuals include the polio vaccine.
