Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA) is an intensive, two-and-a-half-day leadership training program for high school Juniors in District 5300. Students are selected for their leadership potential. In addition to the development of leadership skills.

RYLA is meant to develop understanding of Rotary among youth participants and reinforce and provide recognition for their efforts, accomplishments, skills and potential as leaders. Rotarians serve as facilitators to the students' learning and discovery, as well as role models of Rotary ideals of the Four Way Test and Service Above Self. This week we will hear about the RYLA experience from the students we sponsored at John Muir High School.

First Time at a Rotary Conference!

When we told Maricela and Mark that we had signed up to attend the District Conference in Anaheim, they gave us high fives! Over the next 2 weeks, we stayed in touch to get a better understanding of the conference and how to participate. We did not want to let on that our main goals were to 1) stay at the Disneyland Hotel, 2) go into Disneyland on Sunday and California Adventure on Monday and 3) get away from the Grocery Outlet store and relax!

We arrived on Saturday morning just as the 4 Way Speech Contest was finishing up. The four students competing were all excellent competitors but only one could walk away with the \$5,000 scholarship. We heard from a Past Rotary International Director about the beginning years of Rotary up to the Supreme Court ruling that allowed women to join the organization. After that, all of the conference attendees participated in an abbreviated version of the "Disney Institution Training Module". The focus was on good customer service starting with your own employees... we thought we would just learn about Rotary while attending. We did! Right after the institute, the next speaker talked about the impact that the END POLIO NOW campaign makes around the world. Our speaker crawled from the entrance to the stage, used his arms to lift himself on stage and then proceeded to talk about how he contracted polio at a young age when in India. He was fortunate to be adopted at a young age by a loving couple in the United States who were able to get him health care and support in dealing with this devastating condition.

At lunch, Maricela and Mark were part of 75 Rotary members who carried in a flag from one of the countries where Rotary is active in the world. We heard from the RI President's representative about the current state of Rotary International, the many programs around the world and an update about the Rotary Foundation. After lunch, we headed to a different room to hear about the District 5300 Vocational Team of volunteers who went to Australia last month to talk about the techniques for Human Trafficking Prevention. In one of the SPARKS photos, you will see Maricela, Sarah, Allison and Ruth (from the non-profit Our Rescue - Boldly fighting to eradicate sex trafficking and child exploitation) and Mark. Dinner and program were delightful. We sat with Paul Vercammen from Shelter Box USA. Sarah played some piano to accompany a video about the Eaton fire that featured Maricela's home and the Jimmy Kimmel fundraising clip. At the end of the clip we were asked to stand, with Mark also, to be recognised as the 'heart' of Altadena that keeps beating throughout this period of recovery. We received a standing ovation and it was a moving moment for all. The main speaker was a past Rotary International Director who focused on the future of Rotary. He gave examples of how one Rotarian at a time can make a difference in the community. After dinner, we capped it off with a walk (we even let Mark tag along with us) to Downtown Disney towards the entrances to the theme parks. There we watched the fireworks show before heading back to the hotel.
