LAST WEEK: PCC VETERANS SCHOLARSHIPS

The Altadena American Legion Post, when it disbanded, created through Altadena Rotary Charities an endowment to provide scholarships to Pasadena City College students who were veterans to help them on their educational journey. Working with the Veterans Resource Center (VRC) this year we are providing four \$1500 scholarships.

This week we met three of our four scholarship recipients along with three additional Rotary Restore Altadena Recovery Grant Awardees.



Our four PCC Veterans Scholarship recipients are:

Carter Dandridge: Carter will not be able to attend due to a conflict with his Naval Reserve training.

Carter served in the United States Navy as a Machinist's Mate from May 2012 to July 2022. He deployed multiple times overseas throughout his service and received awards and recognitions, including the Good Conduct Medal, the Global War on terrorism service medal. the Humanitarian Service Medal, and the Meritorious Unit Commendation. Carter originally started his education career at Pasadena City College pursuing computer science, but quickly realized that applied mathematics was where his true passion was. Carter plans to transfer to a four-year university in Fall 2025 to complete his degree and build a career in data science, quantitative analysis, or engineering applications. He continues to serve as a Navy reservist, and this scholarship will allow him to fully commit to coursework, research opportunities, and the pursuit of his long-term career goals.

Rachel Fraser: Rachel served as an Information Systems Technician in the United States Navy from June 2020 to March 2024. While Rachel was serving, she lost a close friend in an accident on the ship. Rachel developed a strong passion to save the lives of those in critical condition, ultimately leading her to pursue a nursing degree. Rachel was also among many affected by the Eaton Canyon wildfire that displaced her from her home. Despite these challenges, Rachel has remained committed in pursuing the goals she has set out for herself. Rachel plans to use this scholarship to help her with books and other supplies that will help her fulfill her dreams of becoming a nurse.

Jason Morales: Jason served in the United States Marine Corps from July 2014 to September 2022. While serving, Jason had several different billets, including Airborne and air delivery specialist, parachutist, and Marine Security Guard. As a Marine Security Guard, Jason served at U.S. embassies and consulates overseas, which gave

him a deep appreciation for other cultures. Because of his experience, Jason aims to attain a Bachelor of Arts in Russian and pursue a career with the Department of State as a Special Agent for the Bureau of Diplomatic Security Service (DSS). Jason intends to use this scholarship to fund access to the language program known as "Babbel" to increase the efficiency in which he will learn Russian to continue his service to the United States.

Yibo Pang: Yibo moved to the United States from China in 2007 and studied Building Construction at Pasadena City College. In 2008 Yibo proudly enlisted in the U.S. Army as a Bridge Engineer and deployed to Afghanistan from 2009 to 2010. While deployed, Yibo learned skills such as bridge construction, boat operations, and heavy vehicle operations. Since completing his military service, Yibo has held diverse roles, including store manager, crane safety manager, and steel structure supply counselor. Currently, Yibo is working on earning a Building Construction license and an AS degree focusing on modern construction methods and materials. His long-term goal is to apply his skills to California's evolving construction industry. Yibo plans to use this scholarship to advance his educational and career goals and support his family, including his children, who are 8 and 10 years old.

I know that our club members really enjoyed the Veteran's Scholarships for students from Pasadena City College. In addition, we also presented checks to a few local non-profits through our Restore Altadena Committee. Another thank you to Lisa and her Committee.

From behind the scenes, our Club Executive Secretary, Mark Mariscal, continues to amaze me, and I sure some of you too. While running around town, he represents our Rotary Club well. On Sunday evening, he was one of the five speakers chosen to speak at the retirement celebration of Jennifer DeVoll, the CEO of the Pasadena Community Foundation. The PCF has been a supporter of our club over the years. And of course, they also have stepped up over the last 20 years with funding support to local non-profits that are physically in the Altadena Community. Since the Eaton Fire in early January, PCF has raised more than \$70 million dollars. PCF created a new entity; the Altadena Builds Back Foundation (ABBF).
