The Rotary Club of Altadena was fortunate to hear a craft talk from a new member this week. Kristen Zolner has been a resident of Altadena for 5.5 years and came to us through Justin Rickard, son of President Designee Lisa Rickard. She and her husband Dave Cole (also a new member), are in the entertainment business. They moved to Altadena from the Hollywood Hills area to find a quieter life

to raise their children. Kristen's first exposure to Altadena came over 20 years ago when she was working with actor John C Rielly, who is a resident of our fair town. Kristen recounted her first trip here to see him and asking herself, "Who would ever live all the way over here?!".

Kristen is a TV producer and Dave is a writer. They have 2 children, 6.5-year-old Billy Sedona and Charlie Eagle, who is 5.5, She began her career in entertainment with various roles and was able to move up the ranks quickly – which is not surprising as she is clearly very intelligent and is a wonderful communicator. She connected with Amazon Studios in 2013 to work on their initial foray into original programming. She was a part of the show "Transparent", which won many awards during its run. Tiring of the culture at Amazon, she then moved to Netflix and was there for 8 years.
