#### THIS WEEK: LISA A. RICKARD

President, U.S. Chamber Institute for Legal Reform (Retired) Executive Vice President, U.S. Chamber of Commerce (Retired)

Location: Altadena Town and Country Club

Lisa A. Rickard served as one of the U.S. Chamber's top leaders on a wide range of issues, with a strong focus on legal reform from 2003 - 2022. She played a significant role in maintaining the Chamber's long-term position as the world's most influential advocate for business.

Rickard served as president of the U.S. Chamber Institute for Legal Reform (ILR) through 2020. Under her leadership, ILR developed from a strong national legal reform organization into a comprehensive, multifaceted global legal reform campaign with cutting-edge legislative advocacy, communications, and voter education initiatives. Rickard's notable accomplishments include leading the effort to enact the landmark Class Action Fairness Act law in 2005; presiding over the creation and expansion of the Madison County Record enterprise - a wholly owned ILR subsidiary chain of nine legal newspaper that count millions of readers annually; and guiding the global expansion of ILR into Europe, Asia, Australia, and the Americas.

Prior to joining the Chamber, Rickard led government affairs practices for Fortune 500 companies Dow Chemical and Ryder System, Inc. She was a partner in the Washington, D.C., law firm of Akin, Gump, Strauss, Hauer & Feld, and she worked on Capitol Hill for two senators.

Rickard has received multiple honors, including two *from The National Law Journal*, naming her as one of the nation's Most Influential Lawyers and one of Washington's Most Influential Women Lawyers. Rickard was also a recipient of the Women & Law Leadership Award recognizing distringuished alumnae of American University Washington College of Law who have made significant contributions to the field of law. In 2015, Rickard received the Burton Foundation Legend in Law award. She served on the board of directors of the Carlton Club, is a member of the Business Government Relations Council, International Association of Defense Counsel, and International Women's Forum, and is an honorary board member of the Burton Awards. Rickard graduated from Lafayette College in Easton, Pennsyvlania, and received her law degree from American University in Washington, D.C., where she was executive editor of the Law *Review*. She is a member of the District of Columbia Bar.

In her presentation last Thursday, Dr. Chen focused on Chinese attire through the ages, starting in 700 AD during the Tang Dynasty. She went into elaborate detail about the style of dress, the meaning of items of attire and the way men and women wore them, supplementing her descriptions with slides

showing paintings of people wearing the various items of clothing. We were told that the outfits that men wore were comprised of two outer items: a shirt with very long and wide sleeves, and a skirt. Colors were also important, with black being seen as exhibiting young, positive energy, and red seen as representing a more of the negative aspect of life. Wen also explained that the left side was also seen as better than the right, so the black part of the outfit would partially cover the red part, crossing over from left to right representing positive energy over negative. Buttons were never used.



Dr. Chen told us that individuals in the various levels of the social strata would wear different styles and fabrics. For instance only royalty and upper class individuals could wear silk. The lower working class individuals could only wear clothing made of cotton. Also, married women would dress differently to single women. As a result, while passing

people along the street, you could tell by their clothing whether they were royalty, upper class or working class, and sometimes whether they were married or single.

We were told of other interesting traditions. For instance, shoes were tilted up at the front to reduce the risk of tripping over the long garments. Men and women did not cut their hair. During wedding ceremonies the bride and groom's hair was often tied together as a symbol of their union. Also, women often wore elaborate decorations in their hair, and men often wore some type of hat, although, we were told, only the emperor could wear the dragon hat.

You will hear more about our presenters between now and the date of our event. Our sponsors have each paid \$250 to get 10 minutes to speak to you and share As different Dynasties came and went, so would the customs regarding what styles of clothing would be deemed appropriate. In the 1600's AD, during part of the Ming Dynasty, earth tones, rather than bright colors, became the standard theme in clothing, representing a desire to be closer to nature. During part of the Qing Dynasty, Mongolian styles became the accepted clothing. After the start of the communist revolution in the early 1900's, traditional clothing was no longer acceptable. Dr. Chen told us that the communist regime introduced a shade of red referred to as blood red, which was unpopular with the masses who preferred the traditional burgundy shade of red.



Another enjoyable presentation from Dr. Wen Chen. She finished by achnowledging that the slides used in her presentation are from the Shen Yun performing arts website. Shen Yun dance performances are a way to see

more of traditional Chinese culture and there are upcoming performances in

Southern California in 2023. Hopefully Dr Wen Chen's visits to our Club and her fascinating descriptions of Chinese history and culture will become a regular occurrence!

1M Milkweed Seeds Giveaway at Altadena Community Garden

On Saturday Jan 21st, René Amy led an event to help the monarch butterflies, through the distribution of over 500 bags containing 1 million native milkweed seeds. René spoke to close to



1000 attendees about the importance of planting native milkweed on which the monarch caterpillars thrive - and destroying any tropical milkweed, that



causes them to perish. Altadena Rotary sponsored seed packets that were offered in exchange for the return of tropical milkweed for disposal. Around 12 families participated in the exchange. René's company Altadena Maid also provided and gave away additional seed packets of native wild flowers. Altadena Rotary has signed the Pollinator Pledge, which is an initiative of RI President Jennifer Jones and an environmental area of focus. A resolution can also be adopted by Clubs and organisations.
