The Altadena American Legion Post, when it disbanded, created through Altadena Rotary Charities an endowment to provide scholarships to Pasadena City College students who were veterans to help them on their educational journey. Working with the Veterans Resource Center (VRC) this year we provided four \$1500 scholarships.

At this week's meeting Craig Cox introduced three of our four scholarship recipients and staff from the Veterans Resource Center. We also heard from Tony Hill who introduced the RYLA students so they could share their experiences with recent leadership training. Last but not least, Tony introduced our winning essay writer and her winning essay is printed below!

Our 2024 Rotary PCC Veteran Scholarship recipients are:

Saul Diaz served in the US Army as a cannon crewmember from August 2015 to August 2021, with deployments in Iraq and Syria. While stationed in Iraq, Saul demonstrated remarkable composure and empathy during a harrowing encounter with a suicide bomber, a moment that crystallized his aspiration for education. This scholarship not only relieves some of Saul's financial pressures but also stands as a testament to his unwavering dedication and resilience forged through his service to the nation. With a commendable GPA of 3.84, Saul is currently pursuing an Associate of Arts in Engineering Technology, with plans to transition to a Bachelor's in Computer Science. **Saul was unable to attend the meeting as he had an interview at Yale University!**



Manuelita "Denny" Sanchez proudly served in the US Navy as an Operations Specialist from June 2013 to July 2021. Inspired by the distinguished military legacy of her paternal grandfather, who served in the Marine Corps, and the revered Navajo Code Talkers within the Marines, she felt a deep sense of duty to follow in their footsteps. Despite this, her innate desire to explore the world led her to enlist in the Navy. Throughout her service, she completed two deployments in the Persian Gulf in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and

Operation Inherent Resolve. Following her initial enlistment, she chose to reenlist and took on the role of Navy Recruiter for Navy Recruiter District San Diego, based in Rancho Cucamonga. Currently, she is diligently pursuing an Associate's degree in Business Administration, will transfer to Cal Poly Pomona in Fall 2024. 

The Ethics of Palestine

What is ethics? In my understanding, ethics is the application of one's values, principles, and self-described purpose in the decision a person makes. Values are the qualities and things we care about. Many care for their friends and family, and agree with values like justice, love, and honesty. They want to treat those they care about well and act according to their values. When we are unable to solely follow our values to make an informed decision, we turn to our principles. Principles are the driving beliefs that dictate the most appropriate course of action in relation to our values. Principles ask the question of an ethical response in each situation. People employ principles in alignment with their customs, values, and beliefs. Some value accountability and adopt the principle of keeping their word. Others place importance of compassion and thus follow the principle of treating others how they want to be treated. But what happens when multiple important qualities and principles have contradicting potential courses of action? Both may be applicable to the situation at hand. How do we distinguish which principle to follow? This is how ethical and moral dilemmas arise.

The ethical dilemma that is disturbing me has to do with events taking place on the other side of the globe. I am referring to the occupation of Palestine by the government of Israel.

The Ethics of Palestine (cont'd below, then opposite)

As most people are aware, the Israeli Defense Forces, otherwise knows as the IDF, are currently preparing to go on the offensive towards Rafah, where over half of Gaza's population is situated. It is very upsetting that over a million people all in southern Gaza would have to flee from what the IDF had once reported to be a safe zone. Even in times of political disarray, there are still ethical policies and rules that should be followed. Ethically, people should not want to cause harm to others.

Despite this conflict being decades long, I want to focus on the current happenings, specifically the ones expanding from October 7, 2023. Since HAMAS' attack on October 7th, 1,410 Israeli lives have been lost. Comparatively, over 28,473 Palestinian people have died. Of the Palestinian casualties, 88 of them were journalists and media workers. This amount is more than double that of journalists' deaths that have occurred during the Russo-Ukraine war over the past 32 years (37 deaths, to be precise). The dilemma of choosing to kill others should not cause a question or debate. The murder of others without thyme or reason is unjust. When looking at the suspiciously high amount of media worker deaths, I cannot help but think that they were targeted. How could a person be killed for wanting to share news? I believe that there are other ways to come to peaceful reconciliation without needless casualties, such as having peace negotiations under a ceasefire.

I bring this up not to excuse or diminish HAMAS's actions, but to demonstrate the disproportionate loss that Palestinian civilians are facing amidst the conflict. It is difficult to miss the constant news and posts regarding the thousands of brutal deaths and killings of Palestinians. In my eyes, there should be no question regarding the dilemma the IDF faces of killing Palestinians. It is part of the government's duty to limit the civilian casualties that result from warfare. Videos circulating the internet showcase powdery, bloodied remains as the sounds of explosions are ever imminent in the background. Parents mourn the loss of their sons and daughters as they carry what is left of them in bags. Children are crying for their dead family members in this war. How can I be indifferent to these occurrences? Earlier, I mentioned how ethics is the way one applies their personal values, principles, and purposes to their decision-making. The last part, purpose, asks why: what is the reason? What is the IDF's purpose in this excessive aggression? Does the IDF's explanation of retaliating against HAMAS excuse the overwhelming number of deaths and immense quantity of collateral damage? It is clear that the IDF's purpose is not simply retaliation, but the complete relocation of Palestinians.

What is the ethical dilemma I face in all this? My ethical dilemma is figuring out if I should just let the killing in Palestine continue or act. It is difficult to talk about morals and righteousness when facing a complex topic of careful consideration and nuance. No matter what decision is made by the groups in power, nothing will reverse all the harm that has occurred. Nevertheless, I want to emphasize the importance of kindness and empathy towards those who are suffering due to these hostilities. I firmly believe that what the Palestinian people currently need most is a call for an immediate and permanent ceasefire. While we watch it unfold from the comfort of our homes, we should ask ourselves what world do we want to live in? Do these events reflect Americans' values? If the answer is no. we should not ignore it. No matter how unsettling it is to view such disturbing media, we should want to adhere to our ethical, moral codes and our compassion for other human beings. We must not look away. The more I know of what is going on in Palestine, the stronger I feel that the killing needs to stop. Those who value righteousness and justice should not desire harm to others. What can I do to improve this instance of lack of ethics? As a U.S. resident, I would support our government providing shelter, medical attention, food, and water to Palestinians and suspend funding Israel's actions towards them. These sentiments and beliefs are what drive me and others to act and make a difference. I support my government officials that feel the same and therefore are speaking up for Palestinians. I will not turn my head to the unjust suffering of Palestinians when it is currently happening. Eyes on Rafah.
