Glendora Rotary is always having special programs but seldom do we get the opportunity to hear about the History of Glendora from a Glendoran whose family has been here since the 1800's who also happens to be our current Mayor.



Today, Mayor David Fredendall presented us with the history of the Fairmount Pioneer Cemetery which was first used as a cemetery in 1875. The property was part of a ranch owned by James C Preston who foresaw the need of the communities of Glendora and Azusa before they were cities. Preston along with a couple other land owners created the Fairmount Cemetery Trust in 1886 in order to preserve the land forever as a cemetery serving the area. There were four different Boards of Trustees who oversaw the cemetery from 1886-1957. Then the cemetery fell into disrepair until a new Board of Trustees was formed in 1988.

Besides some of the early settlers to the area there are persons of note buried there including John & Mary L Dougherty who was the aunt and Uncle of Walter Knott who founded Knott's Berry Farm. The Knott Family was instrumental in financially supporting some improvements years ago.

Ancestors of Mayor Fredendall along with our own Beverly Jafari are also buried there.

Please join the community this Memorial Day for the 148th Memorial Day gathering to recognize those we have lost. The event starts at 11:30 am and this year's Keynote Speaker is Steven Flowers. The cemetery is located at 351 Shorey Dr.

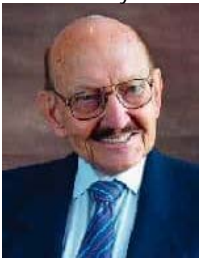

Field of Heroes Member Responsibility

The **Glendora Rotary Field of Heroes** is the gift that keeps on giving. Not only is it one of the most moving displays of patriotism, of small-town charm, of beauty, and positive public relations, but it is also one of the main ways our club funds the many wonderful things we do for the community.

Income from the **Field of Heroes** is split between the **Veterans' Centers at Citrus College and Azusa Pacific** and the **Glendora Police Explorers**, as well as one additional local organization. The remaining balance will be allocated to our Glendora Rotary Charities fund. From this fund most of our community service projects are funded, including the 30k Meal Packing for Shepherd's pantry, feeding the Trails Days volunteers, the Rotary Choral Concert, sending students to Teen Leadership Camp (TLC) and Rotary Youth Leadership Camp (RYLA), and so much more.



This year's income goal is \$25,000. Our Board of Directors is requesting every club member to be responsible for raising up to \$600. This could be via the sale of individual \$50 flags or the procurement of two \$300 sponsorship, or a combination of both opportunities. If everyone pitches in, this goal is well in hand.

The time is now to invite companies and small businesses you have a relationship with, who might like to support this event and become sponsors. Major sponsors will be noted and recognized prominently in many of our public image avenues.

Polio is Not Yesterday's Problem

When we think of polio, we think of black and white photos of people lying in iron lungs. It is easy to forget that polio is a disease of today as much as it was a disease of yesterday.

One of the most inspiring and unforgettable moments of this past weekends D5300 annual conference was the

presentation by Ramesh Ferris. Putting a face on polio, Ramesh contracted the disease at the age of 6 months in India in 1980. His mother gave him up for adoption to an orphanage from where he was fortunate enough to be adopted into a family in Canada. Ramesh had no use of his legs at all. His family advocated for him tirelessly and were able to obtain many surgeries and prosthetics for him. Now, with the aid of a crutch and braces, Ramesh can stand up and walk. Ramesh is 45 years old. He is now a Rotary Paul Harris Fellow, and Rotarian with the Whitehorse Rendezvous Rotary Club and a global advocate for polio eradication.

Such enormous progress has been made to eradicate polio in the world but we can not let down our guard for one moment. As we have seen recently in the news of measles cases popping up, vaccines are vital. Polio has been 99.9 % eradicated from the planet (Pakistan and Afghanistan remaining with a few cases). Our global gift and legacy in the eradication of polio literally lies in the balance as long as there is but ONE case anywhere.
