PDG Steve Garrett "Women in Rotary" A History

The history of women in Rotary is well documented in print and online media but how often do you have the opportunity of hearing about it from someone who was actually there and who actually knew the players. As a member of the Arcadia Rotary Club since 1974, the club that chartered the Rotary Club of Duarte, Steve had a front seat to the drama that began in



1976, ayear in which the Duarte Rotary Club had a dwindling membership and decided to allow three women to join. The only caveat the current District Governor gave them was to use the women's first initials rather than their full first names.

This seemed to be a good workaround until the time came, sooner than expected, for the club to celebrate its 25th anniversary. The Rotary International President of the time sent an official representative to the party, who was horrified to see that the club had admitted women to membership. He hurried back to Evanston and recommended to Rotary International that the Duarte Rotary be stripped of its charter. The rest, as they say, is history. Two court cases, culminating in the Supreme Court ruling that forced Rotary to admit women was the outcome.

One great takeaway from this first-person account was how many of the men of Rotary District 5300 were supportive of women in Rotary. Kudos to John Fee, incoming district governor, and Arcadia Rotarian, who sought out Sylvia Whitlock to personally encourage her to attend PETS (President Elect Training Seminar) to prepare her for her year as President of the Ex-Rotary Club of Duarte.

Back home in Glendora, the first two women in Glendora Rotary were Connie Tiffany (Librarian for the City Library) and Sheila Gutierrez! According to Dottie Hilliard whose husband Keith was the president of the club at the time, he was approached by a number of the male Rotarians whose wives wanted them to

leave the club if women were admitted. There were some ruffled feathers to be smoothed. Old timers in Rotary like to joke that they preferred not to admit women because they didn't want to curtail their ribald joking or have linen tablecloths at meetings or have a centerpiece nicer than a salt and pepper shaker. A visit to enough local clubs will support a conclusion that there is still some clean-up needed on the joke front and that the women of Rotary have more important things to think about than tablecloths or centerpieces at a week-day meeting.

Memorial Day Remembrance at the Pioneer Cemetary

Founded in 1876, the Fairmount Pioneer Cemetery hosted its 148th Annual Memorial Day Observance on Memorial Day 2025. Organized by the Fairmount Pioneer Cemetery Foundation, and represented by Trustees David Fredendall, James B. Cook, III, and Craig Ott, the ceremony took place under auspicious blue skies dotted with white fluffy clouds.

Each veteran in the assembled crowd was asked to stand and state their name and years and branch of service so that they could be properly recognized. The Rotary Club was represented by Joe Babineau and we extend our thanks for his service. Following the recognitions, Wayne Lunde, Bugler, also from American Legion Post 755, played a beautiful and haunting taps, leaving not many dry eyes in the crowd.

A special recognition was given to Matthew Kimball, an Eagle Scout whose project resulted in two new benches at the cemetery, placed to optimize views and quiet reflection. Also recognized were Azusa and Glendora police, fire, and local government dignitaries. Present from Glendora were Mayor Fredendall, Mayor Pro Tem Michael Allawos, and Councilmembers Karen Davis and Mendell Thompson. Past Mayor and Rotarian Gary Boyer and wife/Rotarian Kathy were also in attendance.

Keynote speaker Steven Bluitt-Flowers, a veteran of the United States Air Force, and a Trustee, Citrus College Board of Trustees, gave heartfelt testimony of the experience of many veterans. He spoke of veteran suicide and his experiences of the loss of his



friends. Mr. Bluitt-Flowers is a life-long resident of Glendora. Any opportunity to hear him speak should be seized upon.

This was a fitting and dignified way to spend part of Memorial Day. Looking over the crosses and flags and further up to our San Gabriel mountain range, there was a deep feeling of gratitude, for the veterans, for those that gave all, for the first responders, for our city leaders who create these opportunities to show remembrance and respect, and for our community that fosters friendship, community service, and camaraderie and the kind of small town life experiences that we cherish.

Michael was forthcoming in saying that his first reaction at seeing the owner of that voice, a person clearly homeless, was some discomfort and an unwillingness to say yes. Yet, despite himself, he agreed to let this man help him. That small act of faith led to what is now a monthly homeless dinner in the parking lot of the business, as well as holiday dinners, clothing exchange and providing a maildrop for the homeless to have a physical address to receive their mail.

Tom Stricklin would have been there as he normally is but he was stacking rocks on his trip to England with Elaine.
