# Rotaplast-Changing the World, one Smile at a Time

The Rotary Club of Glendora was so pleased to welcome Rae Kearney, past-president of the Rotary Club of Azusa and a current Executive Assistant Governor for District 5300. Rae was also a non-medical volunteer on a recent Rotaplast mission to Cebu, Philippines.

District 5300 has sponsored nine missions since 2011, to locations in Guatamala, Liberia, Peru, Tanzania, India, Columbia, and most recently, the mission in the Philippines. 69 patients were gifted with 82 life-changing procedures in Cebu. Patients come from many miles away when they hear that a mission is coming, often overcoming dangerous and lengthy journeys for a chance at being selected for surgery.



Those missions are done in concert with Rotaplast International which supplies the medical personnel and logistics for the missions. Rotaplast Intl was a project of the San Francisco Rotary Club but is now a stand-alone charity.

The surgeries that are performed are cleft lip and palate repairs, craniofacial deformities, and burn scar corrections, such as release of adhesions that prevent proper function of limbs. The children who suffer from some of these issues are often ostracized and unable to participate in society. This is very socially debilitating for them and their families.



Rae shared heartwarming anecdotes about her experience in direct patient care before and after their surgeries. The experience of

participating in a Rotaplast Mission is life-changing for the volunteers as well as for the patients.

# Clear Sight brought by the Focometer Project

In 2021, the Glendora Rotary Club embraced a new international program, the Focometer Project. A group of club members traveled to Houston, TX to learn how to use the Focometer hand-held device which allowed non-professionals to measure vision. This electricity-free auto-refractor allowed teams of Glendora Rotarians to travel to Tijuana and Rosarito Mexico and outlying areas, partnering along the way with Rotary Clubs in those areas. Collaboratively, they measured refractive-errors in children and adults and then made prescription-level eye glasses for them. Recipients entered not being able to see the leaves on the trees and left with the gift of better eyesight.

The frames of these glasses are "Harry Potter" shape - cute and round. The lenses are also round, making the assembly of the glasses relatively easy. Putting them on a child's face - priceless!
