

Happy New Year District 5330 Rotarians! Wishing each of you and your families the very best in 2023. Another year behind us and IMAG-INE what is ahead of us.

January is Vocational Services Month. When I was the Vocational Services Chair in RY 19-20 for the District under PDG Melanie Rice (RIP), I always believed that vocational services played an important role in Rotary in a couple of different ways.



First, each of us has a vocation and we bring certain talents and skills to our club. Rotary asks that we use these skills to help our club. This includes lending your talent to help guide the club, serve in a leadership role, or contribute to a project or community service effort. Each of us has hidden talents that we can use to make a difference in our club and to our community. Use your talent and get engaged today.

Second, Rotary has a strong belief system we call The Four Way Test. We recite this at every Club or District meeting. It is one of the world's most widely printed and quoted statement of business ethics. It was created in 1932 by a Chicago Rotarian named Robert J. Taylor, but he didn't create it for Rotary. He was asked to take over a company that distributed cookware products that was upside down with their creditors and facing potential bankruptcy. He created this for his team at this company. The field was very competitive and he needed something his team could embrace that would make them different. He turned to character, dependability, and service mindedness. He established a simple code of business ethics for this team to embrace and strive for. He was so successful that Rotary adopted The Four Way Test in 1943 and Taylor served as RI President in RY 54-55. As Rotarians, we are asked to utilize The Four Way Test in our vocation as our business ethics. Applying The Four Way Test, we can be better doctors, lawyers, business leaders, plumbers, contractors, electricians, teachers, social workers, and the list continues. The four keys of the things we think, say, and do apply not only to our Rotary life, but also to our life outside of Rotary. Put The Four Way Test to use today.

We are at the midpoint of our year together. We have 260,640 Minutes left to Make Rotary Relevant in RY 22-23. There is still time for us to unite and take action to create lasting change – across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves.




- Host an event for business networking and professional development in your community

We are looking for students for 2023-24 Study Abroad Foreign Exchange Program! This is an opportunity of a lifetime, so let's find some students looking for an amazing year abroad!

"Study Abroad" means just that. All foreign exchange students in Rotary International's Long Term Exchange Program (LTEP) are required to attend high school while on exchange. Eligible students who have just graduated from high school and go on exchange during their gap year are still required to attend high school full time in their assigned foreign country – it's a mandatory part of the cultural immersion.

The long-term exchange program usually lasts one academic year, during which you attend school and live with 2-3 families in your host country. This is Rotary International's flagship exchange program. To gain a greater understanding of the culture, you will live with at least two host families during your stay. To ensure your safety, the host Rotary club carefully screens and selects all host families. Additionally, the local host Rotary club pays you a monthly stipend and assigns a dedicated counselor to help you get the most out of your exchange.

Host Family Application

Hosting a Rotary international high school foreign exchange student is a life-enhancing experience for your entire family. It's a unique opportunity to get new perspectives, learn new customs, and share your culture and your community with others. Most of all, you'll build special friendships and connections that often last a lifetime. All high school foreign exchange student programs depend on families who want to be part of the exchange student's experience and open their hearts and homes for 3-5 months. Every year, Rotary districts around the world look for host families willing to explore the challenge of welcoming a student into their home for a meaningful exchange.

Friendship Exchange

Join the Friendship Exchange Team.

Be a part of the Rotary Friendship Exchange (RFE) between Rotary District 5330 and Rotary District 4640, southwestern Paraná State, Brazil. There are openings in the team that will be hosted in Brazil May 5 to May 19, 2023. RFE is self-funded and receives no money from Rotary International or the Rotary Foundation.

Rotary Friendship Exchange is a unique program for Rotarians, adult family, and friends to travel and be hosted by Rotarians in their homes. Our team will make friends of the Brazilian Rotarians, attend some club meetings, see the local sights, businesses and industries, and Rotary service projects. Also, our team will visit Iguassu Falls, one of the natural wonders of the world. You do not need to be a host to join the outbound team but it would be helpful. Hosts are needed for the Brazilian team when District 5330 hosts them: in the Lake Arrowhead area April 11, 12 and 13, 2023; in the Coachella Valley April 19, 20 and 21; and in the Temecula area April 22, 23 and 24. Hosts provide lodging and some meals for their guests. There is no financial obligation beyond that. The Brazilian team consists of one couple, one single man, and nine single women. Generally, hosts have a couple or a single as guests – more if additional beds are available. Contact Ladd for more information about hosting.

To qualify for the Governor's Citation, it is mandatory to have the 2022-2023 District 5330 Compliance affidavit on file with the District Youth Protection Officer. Your club should also be current with the RI and District dues.

The Club President must submit a report to the District Governor by May 1st, 2023 to apply for this Award. In summary, please report on progress from each area below and how your club has achieved the requirements.

- Honor the treat that Rotary and fellow Rotarians provide and not do mything that will bring disfavor or reflect wherealy on Rotary or fellow Enteriors
- Not seek from a fellow Returian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.

DECLARATION OF ROTARIANS

IN BUSINESSES AND PROFESSIONS



As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession, I am expected to:

- 1) CONSIDER my vocation to be another opportunity to serve;
- RE FAITHFUL to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standards of my community;
- DO ALL in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;
- BE PAIR to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public, and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
- HECOGNIZE the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
- 6) DEFER my vocational calents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;
- ADHURE to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or profession;
- NEITHER SEEK from not grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relacionship.
