Speaker - Tom Atchley, Historian

Tom's talk focused on the various ways that Redlanders have participated in serving our country and protecting our freedom. He spoke about the people from Redlands who participated in all the wars.

He reminded us that the pledge of Allegiance, written by Francis Bellamy so impressed a Kingsbury School teacher, Mary Fackler, that she started using it in her class in Redlands. Henry Lauton was responsible for bringing the idea to Washington and the rest is history!

Tom told us about the battle of Los Angeles when a bunch of geese flying over soon after Pearl Harbor, freeked everyone out as they thought they were under attack from Japanese planes! He talked about how the Japanese Americans living in Redlands tried to go Arizona to avoid being locked up in the concentration camps.



He described how Italian POWs were used to pick fruit while the men were off at war. Then the Bracero program was started where men from Mexico could legally come to US on a short-term basis to pick fruit ...this ended in 1975. Wartime was a good time for the citrus industry as the Government bought every orange as there was a great need for Vit C. to avoid scurvy.

My notes cannot do justice to his extensive talk. I asked him if he could give me a copy so that I could refer you to that.
