Our Club enjoyed a fascinating talk given by Doug Scott, a new member of our Club who has transferred in from the Sunup Rotary Club. Doug has spent most of his career as a passionate advocate and lobbyist for the United States Wilderness Areas. As of 2019, there were 803 Wilderness areas totaling more than 110 *million* acres. Doug stressed that getting outdoors is a fundamental characteristic of the American character. He read from works by Henry David Thoreau and John Muir, among the most famous environmentalists. Both cherished the "art of walking" and feeding their "hunger for natural beauty." Doug stressed the need for youth today to engage with nature.

Doug's passion is a perfect fit for Rotary International's work in preserving the environment, our latest Area of Focus. # JULY 05 PROGRAM

This week's program was by Zubair Bakubye Zubair is a member of Riverside East Rotary club and founder of ITT Vocational Training in Uganda. The program first started with the Mothers of Peace which advocates for neglected children of war in Uganda. They started with literacy programs for mothers and 20 former child soldiers. From the Mothers of Peace program, initially funded by a Rotary Grant, the ITT training program developed.

Programs included tailor/sewing and computer skills. In Uganda unemployment among young people is 60-70% due to lack of training and education. Once people complete the computer skills program they are guaranteed a job. The school was initially funded by a \$47,000 Rotary grant. Ongoing funding comes from the goods and services developed by those attending ITT. Items such as bricks, clothing, etc. are sold and 70% of the proceeds go to support the school and 30% goes to the students to help support them during their training.

The school is currently looking for funding to complete space to accommodate a nursing program.

<u>Current Needs</u> -Girl's hostel -School kitchen/dining room -Fencing of the school grounds (required by law) -Construction of girl's septic

The school is looking for funding to complete these initiatives. In order to learn more or donate there will be a website within the next month or so. The budget for these projects is less than \$68,000 USD.
