Our speaker today was our member, Jack Fitzsimmons. Jack is the Chairman of our Club's International Service Committee.

Jack pointed out several global risk issues that Rotary International is working on:

- Polio Plus
- Climate change; services for armed conflict refugees
- Malnutrition
- Economic Inequity

He pointed out that even though these efforts are vitally important, our club should also be supporting smaller, more focused efforts. Jack would like us to consider supporting the "Amigos to Guatemala" project that 25 other clubs are now supporting. The program includes four projects in Guatemala:

- providing clean and safe water supplies
- microloans for a beekeeping cooperative
- providing medical supplies
- expanding sustainable community gardens.

Jack described the steps Rotary International takes to manage our annual contributions to the Rotary International Foundation. After the money is invested for three years, it is returned to the District and disbursed back to the clubs for use in supporting qualified projects. Jack would like to see us commit our currently available \$1,300 to support this project.

Jack also reported that 70 high school students have been involved with developing the community gardens project funding by our Community Block Grant which will culminate in a Family Day at the high school where harvested food will be prepared and served by the PSHS Garden and Interact Club students.

Jack encourages any member interested in international service to contact him.

The Salton Sea environmental crisis has been in the headlines in the last several years. Last November, the Federal Government announced a \$250 million investment to accelerate environmental projects around the shrinking Salton Sea to help address the deterioration of local ecosystems and help mitigate hazardous dust. Numerous stakeholders are involved: State(s) and Federal (US and Mexico) Governments, the Imperial Valley Irrigation District, corporate agricultural players, small farmers and ranchers, tribal leaders, local communities – and increasingly – investors in the potentially huge economic bonanza of lithium extraction from the seabed.

Why does this matters to us here in Palm Springs? The pollution created by the drying sea is blown up the length of the Coachella Valley by wind off the Gulf. Sure, we get the occasional "rotten egg" smell when the wind shifts, but that same wind is carrying the health-threatening particulates that make the local kids so sick. Air pollution does not respect geographic boundaries and with the drying of the sea caused by climate change and reduced water recharging from the at-risk Colorado River, the situation has become critical for *all* residents in the Coachella Valley.

Rotary International has designated the environment as our *Seventh Area of Focus*. The following page highlights what we are doing in this area and opportunities for us to get involved.

in Foundation global grant funding has been allocated to environment-related causes in the past five years through our support of community economic development and water, sanitation, and hygiene projects.


