Jeanmarie Bond introduced our moderator for the candidate forum, Helen Anderson Cruz. Helen announced the candidates: Bill Sandke, Shawnee Barton Merriman, Renee Cavanaugh, and Fitz Lee.

Q1: Please introduce yourself and tell why you are qualified to serve on the CUSD Board of Trustees.

Bill: He has been on City Council, is a middle of the road guy, has a long history of volunteering in the community

Shawnee: Mom of 4, professor at Cal State Long Beach, creative problem solver, teacher

Renee: Retired teacher, MS in Human Resource Management, has had governance training, has been on the boards of CSF, Optimists, CJWC, etc.

Fitz: He has proven leadership, spent 30 years in the Navy, worked with Senator John McCain, has a lot of budget experience at all levels (Federal to local)

Q2: What do you consider to be the number one and biggest challenge facing CUSD today, and how do you plan to address that challenge?

Fitz: Budget. He would work with Donnie Salamanca. Find ways to generate revenue. State is relaxing rules on ADA so that would help some.

Renee: Budget is the biggest problem, but there are others such as coordinated mental health services, deferred maintenance, etc. Budget—strategic utilization of grants (i.e., DoDEA), attendance, personnel issues.

Shawnee: Planning for the future is the long term problem; budget is the short-term biggest problem. We need to look at big, courageous ideas. We need to serve better the kids who are exceptional learners; we need language in our elementary schools.

Bill: Budget. We need to have a long-term plan for Basic Aid; we need to right-size our classes.

Q3: What is your understanding of the role and professional responsibilities of a school board trustee?

Shawnee: Managing the superintendent, making sure the budget is balanced, assuring student achievement, and communication.

Fitz: It is a governing board. We have to approve the budget, curriculum, books. It takes a lot of prep work and knowledge. Communication is key.

Bill: Governing. We create policy, allow public to comment, have an understanding of what we can and cannot do, be an ambassador for our schools, communication.

Renee: Accountability and oversight. Connect citizens to the school district, guide district to meet goals. Communication is important.

Q4: What would you identify as the BEST thing about the Coronado Unified School District?

Renee: Partnership with the military and the experiences that the military brings to the classroom. Being a small district, it is easier to pivot to add things. CUSD has a good partnership with the community.

Bill: Every Child, Every Day means that we are able to use resources outside the classroom. CUSD is part of the community. No child gets left behind.

Fitz: People are the greatest asset. We can leverage groups to become mentors to students. Basic Aid will help more money go to the district. We are small so we can be personal.

Shawnee: Quality education. We have high educational standards, great athletic programs (we have middle school sports), and a great nutritionist so the kids have good choices.

Audience Question: What are you going to do to support kids with special needs?

Bill: We do have programs. We could partner with Safe Harbor for mental health needs.

Shawnee: We don't have a transparent path to resources. We need to bring back the GATE program.

Renee: We have a 30% turnover rate because of military connected students. We need to address gaps in learning. Proficient readers in 3rd grade are more likely to graduate. We need to coordinate special ed programs.

Fitz: There has been a rise in problems after Covid, especially psychological issues. Special Ed requirements need to be looked at.
