

## **Emperor Penguins On The Move To Find Cooler Temperatures, Better Ice For Chicks**



Nobel laureate, Dr. Russel Schnell, in his presentation (slides <u>here</u>) on January 25th, mentioned the effects of climate change on Emperor Penguins. In 2022, 95% of chicks drowned due to ice melting before they were ready to fledge!

#### Penguin colonies seen for first time

Previously unknown colonies of emperor penguins have been spotted in new satellite imagery. Emperor penguins, considered  $\hat{a}\in \infty$  near threatened  $\hat{a}\in \infty$  with extinction, are the world  $\hat{a}\in \mathbb{T}^{M}$ s largest penguins. They raise their chicks in Antarctic winter on patches of frozen sea ice. But if the ice breaks up before the chicks have fledged, most will die.

At least some emperor penguins are moving their colonies as melting i ce from climate change threatens breeding grounds, according to research released Wednesday. One penguin colony near Halley Bay appears to have moved around 19 miles to the east, said Peter Fretwell, a researcher at the British Antarctic Survey. He said unstable conditions beginning in 2016 had made the old location perilous.

"Emperor penguins have taken it upon themselves to try to find more stable sea ice,†he said.

The four newly found colonies likely existed for years, but scientists hadnâ $\in$ <sup>IM</sup>t previously spotted them, said Fretwell. They are mostly small colonies, with fewer than 1,000 breeding pairs each, he said. Scientists currently know of 66 emperor penguin colonies. The newly spotted colonies donâ $\in$ <sup>IM</sup>t greatly change population estimates â $\in$ " fewer than 300,000 breeding pairs â $\in$ " but they help scientists understand where penguins might be moving, said Fretwell. Itâ $\in$ <sup>IM</sup>s unclear whether any of the newly identified colonies could be breakaway groups from other larger colonies, said Daniel Zitterbart, a penguin researcher at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, who was not involved in the study. But itâ $\in$ <sup>IM</sup>s clear that a warming world means more â $\in$ œpenguins will be on the move, â $\in$  he said.


## **Pollinator Conservation Webinar Opportunity**
