
It was disappointing to have the Discovery Lab meeting canceled this summer, so we are glad that Lynnsey could re-schedule. See story and photos on page 1.

A Rotary Journey Down Under: The Melbourne Convention Experience

Becky and I had the privilege of attending the Rotary International Convention in Melbourne, Australia, in 2023, and what an extraordinary journey it was. As we stepped off the plane onto Australian soil, we knew we were in for a memorable experience.

The convention brought together Rotarians from all corners of the globe, creating a vibrant group of cultures, ideas, and shared values. The first thing that struck us was the

warm hospitality of our Australian hosts. They welcomed us with open arms and that unmistakable Aussie charm, making us feel right at home.

The convention was a true testament to Rotary's commitment to service above self. We attended the traditional flagsof-the-world ceremony, followed by

three days of general sessions, seminars and workshops on various topics, including community development, humanitarian projects, the environment, ending

polio, and youth empowerment. One standout session was the Sylvia Whitlock Award presentation, named for the first



female Rotary Club President, awarded to Chin Mei Lu of the Rotary Club of Taipei, Taiwan, for her more than 30 years of working for women and girls around the world.

Of course, the keynote address by Rotary International President Jennifer Jones, stressed her theme of "Imagine

What's Next." She emphasized the importance of hope, change and vision for a better future, and her speech resonated with all the attendees. We also heard from RI General Secretary, John Hewko, speaking about peace and the plight of refugees, particularly in his birth country, Ukraine.

Rotary's commitment to eradicating polio was prominently featured as well. We attended an inspiring Rotary Foundation session on the progress made in the

fight against polio, with data-backed presentations illustrating how close we are to achieving a polio-free world. It was heartening to see the impact of our contributions and know that our efforts are making a real difference in the lives

of children and families worldwide.

Networking opportunities were abundant, allowing us to connect with fellow



Rotarians, exchange ideas, and forge new friendships. We had insightful discussions with Rotarians from different backgrounds, and these conversations opened up new avenues for potential collaboration on future projects.

Throughout the convention, Melbourne's rich diversity was on full display, and we enjoyed a number of City-sponsored events including a Night at the Museum, and Streets of Melbourne for food and fun.

The Rotary International Convention in Melbourne was a truly transformative experience. It reinforced our belief in Rotary's mission and the power of individuals coming together to effect positive change. As we return to Oklahoma, we carry with us a wealth of knowledge, fresh perspectives, and a renewed commitment to service, and we hope our presentation inspired you to the same.
