

#### **Governor Craig's April Message**



April is Maternal and Child Health Month for Rotary

Maternal and Child Health focuses on prevention, health care, and health education for women, infants and children. This health care aims to provide these populations with access to quality health care, education, and basic necessities that promote healthy lifestyles, such as proper nutrition, adequate sanitation and clean water. Rotary, along with public health organizations, is concerned with how improvement can be made in health care resources for women, including pregnancy and reproductive resources, as well as resources for infant and child well-being.

Maternal and child health is important because it affects the livelihoods of the next generation, which affects communities, families, and the health care system. The need to properly and timely identify health risks, such as depression, violence, drug and alcohol abuse, and inadequate nutrition is vitally important.

Women, children, and infants face unique challenges, especially those living in

impoverished areas. Approximately 850 women die every day from pregnancy and childbirth complications. Almost all deaths occur in low-resource environments, and most are preventable. Rotary International is working with the World Health Organization to facilitate positive change and alleviate restrictions, improve education, and reduce the numbers of deaths and problems.

#### **Springdale Club Completes Water Grant in India**

The Rotary Club of Springdale has completed a project providing water to 13,000 people in India. The grant was a project of Past District Governor John Brodbeck, recently deceased. The ever-outgoing John met Rotarian Pankaj Patel at the International Convention and learned of the drought conditions in rural India some 75 miles from Mumbai. Scarce water required women to take long treks to fetch it for their families, and farmers were virtually unable to grow crops.

A plan to add ten water retention ponds in several tribal areas was developed by the Pune Far East Club and District 3131. Funds from the Springdale Rotary Club of \$1,900 were provided, and an additional \$5,000 in our District 6110 designated funds were committed with Foundation Chair Ed Hardesty's assistance. With these matching funds and the Rotary Foundation, the entire Global Grant totaled \$96,415. Other partners included the Pune Central Rotary Club, Pune University and District 3131.

The project stores water in the ponds during the monsoon season which is then used for drinking water and farming throughout the year. The deeper storage facilities also increased water percolation and raised the water table of numerous wells in the vicinity. About 500 acres of agricultural land in the area benefitted from this project, which enabled villagers to have water for drinking purposes for their cattle & agriculture (irrigation) year-round, thus raising the local economy (multiple crops per year) & reduced migration to the urban areas.

With the approval by the Rotary Foundation of the grant, construction began swiftly and has just been completed.

One interesting connection: the ponds will be maintanied by a **Rotary Community Corps** in the villages. A Rotary Community Corps (RCC) is a group of non-Rotarians who share our commitment to changing the world thru service projects. This provides the sustainability of the project.

WHAT'S THIS ALL ABOUT? When we ask Rotarians to support the Rotary Foundation it all goes to help people. Here is a specific example of our fellow Rotarians making life better for more than 13,000 people!



Have you wanted to attend a Rotary International Convention, but found the travel costs prohibitive? That won't be a problem this year, as the RI annual event will again be conducted virtually.

Originally planned for Taipei, Taiwan, the decision to present the Convention as a virtual event was made by the Rotary Board of Directors, to protect the health of everyone involved. It will be held June 12 thru 16, 2021. The Virtual Convention will be open to all Rotary members and participants. Event registration will open in mid-April and will include a promotional fee of \$49 for 21 days, with an increase afterward to \$65.

The Rotaract, Youth Exchange Officer, and Inter-Country Committee preconventions will be held 10-11 June 2021. The cost of each preconvention event is \$20. Both the convention and preconvention events include access to the House of Friendship.

All pre-registrations for the original in-person event are being refunded.




Paul Harris plants a friendship tree in Lakeland, Florida, USA, in 1942.

Dear Rotary International District 6110,


