


#### District Governor's Message April 2023

Past District Governor Ellis Potter and his committee are working to establish a new District-

wide program for cultural exchanges with a Rotary District in southern Chile. Many Rotarians will remember the former Group Study Exchange (GSE) program which ended a few years back. Our new D2D (District to District) program takes many elements of that and updates it.

Here's the scoop:


- In the Fall of 2023, a group of 4 newer District Rotarians, led by a more senior Rotarian will travel to District 4355 in southern Chile and stay for two weeks, soaking up the

culture and learning about Rotary in Patagonia. November is springtime there! This is a beautiful country with mountains, volcanoes, lakes, islands, fjords, and a mild climate, but most of all, friendly people and great Rotarians!

- In the spring of 2024, a similar group will travel here from Chile and see the sights of our area. So each team's visit happens in the spring in that area.
- Each team will stay in the homes of Rotarians and travel around the district with Rotarians.
- While only 5 Rotarians will travel, the incoming team can visit any District club that is willing to host them for a few days. This amplifies the exchange.
- Rotarians will apply to be selected after having been approved by their club. We are looking for younger members who have been in Rotary 5 years or less. Having a working knowledge of Spanish is extremely helpful, if not critical!
- Cost is expected to be about \$2,000 per team member. It can be paid by the sending club and/or the team members by doing fundraisers, tapping sponsors, etc.
- The team will be selected far enough in advance that they will have a few months to establish virtual Zoom-like exchanges, and plan the activities themselves.

From teambuilding to "challenge by choice", RYLA pushes each student to a place where, when they are challenged with "what's next", they have a plan when they leave camp on Sunday!

"It definitely was an honor to be a part of the hot pink tribe. They've all influenced and inspired me to change for the better. I would say my tribe got the closest to being a family. I have

never been able to be myself, but at this camp I did. It's special to me because this camp is not over, we're still connected and will grow together to further impact our communities!"

"I drove a camper to camp and he didn't know anyone else who was going to be there. He was really nervous and didn't think he would make any friends while he was there. By the end of the weekend, he had a whole group of friends to say goodbye to and he talked on the way home about how much fun he had!"

#### **Wheelchair Mission Trip**

Springdale Rotarian Noel Morris led a group of about 40 Rotarians and friends last month on his

20th trip to deliver much needed wheelchairs in La Paz, Mexico. This is a partnership with the American Wheelchair Mission which is headed by Chris Lewis (son of the late actor/comedian Jerry Lewis). The program began with the Springdale Rotary Club and has expanded to include Rotarians from many District clubs. They have provided mobility for thousands of people in several locations in rural Mexico, Panama, Costa Rica, Jamaica, and Arizona.

The specially designed wheelchairs cost about \$150 each, and the group distributed about 100 of them, and left others for later use. The chairs would sell for about \$500 at a regular medical supply store.

This event took place at and thru the auspices of "CRIT" (Teleton Rehabilitation Centers for Children) in La Paz, and some wheelchairs were delivered directly to children in the area.

Juan Pablo, is a seven-year-old boy from La Paz, Mexico. Born with Spina Bifida, he is unable to walk. Juan was so excited when he received his new wheelchair that he took off down the sidewalk for literally two and a half blocks to his school. Not only did he want to show us his school, but he also wanted to show that he can now get there on his own! His final words to us were, "I Love You!" His life (and family) has changed, all because a Rotarian donated \$150 dollars for a wheelchair!

District Governor Nominee Warren Lovinger and his wife Marilyn attended their first Wheelchair Mission. Warren noted that "it was an emotional and extremely humbling experience to participate in this process, both at the CRIT regional rehab center and at the homes of those who were truly homebound. We were amazed by the consistent positivity, graciousness, and determination of the disabled children and their very supportive families. All of us returned home with great admiration for these courageous Mexican people!"

Noel is already planning the next wheelchair mission in March of 2024. Each participant pays their own way - usually air fare is less than \$1000 and hotel is \$600-900. Some Rotarians have brought their own children or grandchildren for them to have a taste of service. If you can't attend, consider buying a wheelchair (or two) for \$150 each to change a child's life.

As Noel Morris says, "Next to raising our two sons, this is probably the most meaningful thing we have done."

#### Parsons Rotary Club Expands Trail system

The Parsons Rotary Club has secured **\$100,000** to expand its trail system. A grant of \$50,000 from T-Mobile "Home-Town Grant" was used to leverage another \$50,000 from a Blue Cross and



Blue Shield "Pathways to a Healthy Kansas" grant. The T-Mobile grant to the club was one of only 25 cities in the USA to receive this funding.

The club partners with the City of Parsons to allow Rotary to build the long-awaited connecting link between the Frisco Trail and the Parsons Rotary Trail. In addition, bicycle lane markings will be added.

Club member, Ann Charles, who wrote and

managed the grant process, noted that the addition will provide an "enhanced opportunity for healthy and safe outdoor pursuits for our community."

The new connecting link between the Parsons Rotary Trail in Glenwood Park and the Arboretum will start on Morton Street west of Central, travel east to Central, north to Appleton, east to

17th and south to Morton where it will connect with the Frisco Trail, which travels east on Morton.

The city will clear trees along the new trail path and emergency blue box cameras monitored by Parsons police will be installed at two locations along this stretch.

Rotarian Charles noted, "The beauty of this is that while many activities come with a price tag, these trails provide a wonderful and attractive location not only to exercise but to visit with your friends, your neighbors and to play all at no cost," she said. "In an income-stressed community like Parsons, it is



essential to be able to attract grant funds like T-Mobile's, and it's amazing to be successful in

obtaining one."


