Impact…what is our impact?

While geeking out about the eclipse, I was amazed by the number of people across North America watching this event. And basically, every member of District 6110 could see it…maybe not full totality but still an incredible experience of an eclipse. In terms of measurement, while the "geek out factor†is useful, we could use this incredible natural phenomenon to say over 3,000 people were impacted…every person in 6110 could see it at totality or near totality.

The Rotary Action Plan provides clubs and districts four priorities to structure our activities:

- Increasing our impact,
- Expanding our reach,
- Enhancing participant engagement, and
- Increasing our ability to adapt.

Take that idea and start thinking about our projects. How many children received a dictionary? Every dictionary is one touch and probably more. When we deliver wheelchairs through the American Wheelchair Mission, we know we touch one person…the person in the chair…but we probably actually impact 2-10 or more other people. And these projects also enhance the participation of our members because many Rotarians talk about delivering a dictionary or wheelchair as a Rotary moment. It is why they do Rotary. Can you describe why you do Rotary? (I do Rotary primarily because of polio eradication. But that is evolving to autism and dementia for very personal reasons.)

On April 11, on the Tulsa NBC affiliate (KJRH), our Medical Supplies Network, INC (MSNI) was featured for our work with Ukraine. We were told by a Ukrainian we are making a difference. When you sort and pack a box, you will never see the person who opens it, and yet, it makes a difference.

I could go on and on about so many of your projects. When we provide money for something, we need to start thinking about the impact. How many people did that big check touch!? When you make the presentation, ask how many lives these funds will impact.

I had an interesting conversation with a non-Rotarian a few days ago. When I mentioned Rotary, he started telling me about a \$500 scholarship he received from a Rotary Club 40 years ago that helped him attend Oklahoma State. We made an impression. We have left a positive view of our organization.

We are in the last 3 months of the *Create Hope* Rotary year. The District Conference is a big event still to come. I hope you will join us as we celebrate the impact our clubs and Rotarians are making. I hope our special speakers will give you inspiration to create magic in a project in the year to come.

And I'm excited about a few of the special parts of the District Conference. First, I'm so excited that our **4-Way Test Speech Contest** will be back during lunch for the finals. I know we touch lives through that event. Second, Kids at Conference is back, and I have a special gift for each young KAC participant from a Rotarian in the Rotary Club of Bartlesville. And last, but not nearly everything, we are going to celebrate and have fun on Kentucky Derby and Star Wars Day! (May the Fourth be with you)

Thanks for reading, and I'II see you around the District. And hopefully, at the District Conference on May 3-4, 2024 in Rogers, AR.
