Muskogee Rotary Club includes District 6110's longest-serving members

The best way to live a long, fulfilling life may be joining the Rotary Club of Muskogee. The 109-year-old club is honored to have three nonagenarians, each with seven decades of membership, making them the longest-serving Rotarians in District 6110.

Jack L. Farr, 95, practically grew up in Rotary. His father served as District Governor (District 124, 1938-39) and a Rotary International Director. He recalls his father returning from a meeting in 1943 and announcing that Rotary was adopting The Four-Way Test as a guide for how members should conduct themselves in business and in life.

Farr joined Rotary right out of college in 1950 in his hometown of Clinton, Oklahoma. He has been a

member in Muskogee twice – 1955-65 and 1975present – and also Drumright, Ada and El Reno,



Oklahoma, with jobs in city management and life insurance. He is a past president and helped establish

the Tahlequah, Oklahoma, club.

"I've tried to be in a position to help," he said. "The Rotary clubs have changed so much. When I started, there was a very restricted membership process. Only the executives of businesses could be in it. No women." He was in club leadership following Rotary International's watershed decision in 1989 to allow female members.

Fellow Muskogee Rotarians consider **Ted Hine**, **96**, a living legend in the club and the community. Until a hip replacement at age 88, Hine ran five miles daily and he still regularly

walks two to three miles. With his energy, dedication, and membership status, Hine remains the club's de facto historian, more than half a century after being president in 1957-58.

"I've enjoyed being in Rotary and have gotten to do a lot of things through Rotary," Hine said. "There's a lot of good things about Rotary, but one of the best things is the people you meet."

During World War II, Hine served as a U.S. Navy hospital corpsman in San Diego, California, caring for those wounded in the Pacific theater. Following studies at the University of Oklahoma and dental school in Kansas City, he returned to his hometown and was invited to join the Muskogee Rotary Club in January 1953.



As a young professional, Hine was in awe that he could stand shoulder-to-shoulder with local leaders in finding ways to improve their community. His advice to younger Rotarians and potential members is to get involved and build relationships.

"Stay right with it and become as big a part of it as they have time. It pays off in so many ways," he said.

Ken Meyer, 96, followed Hine into Muskogee Rotary one month later in February 1953. The Woodward, Oklahoma, native switched from criminal law to financial law when he moved to Muskogee to work in the trust department in at First National Bank.

"I was told by the leaders in my bank that there's one club to join and that is the Rotary Club, and they were right," he said. "You get to know the people who do business for the town." Being in the banking industry, he naturally became the club's treasurer, a position he held for an astounding 40 years. He also wielded the presidential gavel 1968-69. Meyer is also a U.S. Navy veteran, having served as a Radioman 3rd class



during World War II 1943-46 and Korea 1950-53.

All three elder Rotarians take pride in the work their club does for the community, from sponsoring a park to donating to charity and ringing the Salvation Army bell during the holidays. "Don't go to Rotary just as a luncheon," Meyer said. "They've

got all these projects going and when you get in those projects, you'll find that they really are meaningful to the future of Muskogee, to your own personal future, and to your fellow Rotarians."

Farr, Hine, and Meyer proudly represent the rapidly dwindling Greatest Generation, those individuals who survived the Great Depression and the Second World War to witness remarkable advances in areas such as medicine, technology, and civil rights. All three long-time Rotarians have taken a step back from participating in the more laborintensive club activities. They are satisfied gathering with friends at the weekly club lunches at the Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame and imparting wisdom gained from their Rotary experience and long lives well lived.

"It's been a very fun influence on my life," Farr said. "I've tried to live The Four-Way Test. If somebody will do that, they'll be in pretty good shape."

WHAT'S THIS ALL ABOUT? A few months back, the Tulsa Will Rogers Rotary Club noted their member Phil Keeter joined Rotary in 1961 and may be the longest serving Rotarian in the District. The Muskogee Rotary Club quickly countered with two members who joined their club in 1953. Gena Parson, a District Public Image committee member, was dispatched to Muskogee to get the scoop, and found another member who became a Rotarian in 1950!

Not only will this be a fantastic experience, but it can also count towards your club's International Service goals. Here are some details to know now and more information will be provided to those who respond:

 Since the conference is being held in Tulsa, all clubs in the Tulsa area are

invited to participate.

- Pick up students on Friday the 27th between 1 and 5 p.m.
- Return students on Saturday the 28th between 3:00 and 3:30 p.m.
- District 6110 Code of Conduct and the Youth Exchange Host Family Rules and Information documents will need to be signed and returned.
- Brief zoom training sessions will be provided and arranged a week before the event.
- In following the District 6110 Youth Protection policy, anyone 18 and over living in a
 host family home will need to have a background check done if one has not been
 completed in the last year. A link will be provided to complete this process.
- If you have any questions, contact Cathy Webster at the above email address or via text at 918-625-5720.

If you would like to host for the Friday night - read on!

Each host family must take at least two students. You can take more but be mindful of how many can fit in your vehicle. A clean carpeted floor/blankets and shared bathroom are perfectly acceptable. In some cases, you might need to make a pallet for them as the kids who fly do not bring sleeping bags. Feed them dinner on Friday and breakfast & lunch on Saturday. A big pot of chili and games are fun, or you can take them to a local



restaurant, enjoy movies at home, take them sightseeing in Tulsa, or team up with another host family and play games or do whatever you think the students will enjoy. The important thing is to welcome them and have fun!

You do not need to be a Rotarian to host students, but you do have to follow the rules and ensure a safe environment for the students. We are committed to providing a safe environment for all who are involved with youth. Some folks are not happy about the new Youth Protection Policy, but it is the Rotary International standard. It is important to understand that practicing due diligence and having complete records protects not only the youth but also all the volunteers.

Rotary Youth Exchange Outbound Interviews

On December 3, 2022, District 6110 Youth Exchange Study Abroad Interviews took place at Haas Hall Academy in Fayetteville, Arkansas. Nineteen Rotarian and non-Rotarian interviewers came from across the district: Fayetteville, Springdale, Fort Smith, Miami, Tulsa, Harrison, and Coffeyville. Ten Rotex (former exchange students) also served as interviewers. The group interviewed 9 students and several parents, who came from Tulsa, Bentonville, Springdale, and Fayetteville.

At the lunch break, the D6110 participants watched an interview-style Zoom with 4 of our 6 outbound students currently overseas: Phoebe in Spain, Kelly in Germany, Savannah in France, and Joseph in Colombia.

Melbourne, Australia Convention

I encourage our D6110 Rotarians to visit RI's website regarding Melbourne, Australia and

our convention there (convention.rotary.org). This site has a large amount of information about dates (Saturday, May 27 through Wednesday, May 31, 2023), registration cost (\$475 each until 12/15, then \$575 each thru March 31, 2023), the Program, hotel availability, transportation, and general information about Melbourne.

Because we are crossing the International Dateline, we will need to leave the U.S. on Thursday, May 25th in order to arrive in Australia on May 27th. United and American are U.S. airlines that fly directly to



Melbourne, as does Qantas and Air New Zealand (by way of Auckland NZ). Roundtrip airfare will likely be about \$3500 per person. Many of us who attend will add a few days before or after the meeting to visit other parts of Australia and/or New Zealand. To date, 18 District 6110 members and guests have registered to attend, including 16 Oklahomans and two Missourians. We certainly hope that other D6110 Rotarians and guests will choose to attend this very special event! Our District's attendees should plan to get together there at least once, perhaps for a meal.
