

History: Larry Lunsford began the project:

- Rotarian since 1991 and currently Trustee of The Rotary Foundation, Past RI Director, and member of KC Plaza Club.

- DG of Missouri's District 6040 in 2001-02 and started Shoe Drive with **Buckner International**.
- In 2005, Missouri Districts 6060 and 6080 joined Shoe Drive and 70,766 pairs were collected statewide in Missouri.
- Shoes are distributed worldwide thru partner **Buckner International**. This year's shoes will go to Kenya, Peru, and the Dominican Republic.



District 6110:

We USED TO participate in Shoes for Orphan Souls several years ago, and now... in 2023-24, the Missouri statewide competition has been renewed â€" now FOUR MISSOURI DISTRICTS with 6110! (with OK/KS/AR Rotary clubs invited also!)

District 6110 Shoe Goal = 2170 pairs $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$ new and close-toed for toddlers to 18-year-olds. All sizes ok, biggest need Boys size 7-12, breaks down to each MO Rotarian bringing 1 pair per month Nov-March for a total of 5 pairs: 434 Missouri Rotarians*1 pair per month*5 months=2170

Focus 2023-2024: the 10 Missouri Clubs, with Wally Bloss (Joplin), Marsha Jones (Mt Vernon), and Warren Lovinger (Nevada) (email links below) coordinating. Other 6110 clubs are welcome to join in the fun project â€" contact us!!! Next year, expand to the whole district?

Strategies:

- Contact local shoe/discount/department store managers about final clearances, and get them!
- Involve friends and family to look for shoes.
- Involve other local service organizations to join shoe drive: Elks, Kiwanis, Soroptimists, Lions, etc.
- Post shoe drive info on social media
- Press releases about shoe drive to newspapers, radio, TV, other media (see attachment to the Newsletter)


She has two children: her daughter Sarah is a graduate student at Washington State and her son Rob is studying abroad in Florence as a University of Southern California student.

By undertaking these activities, you bring vocational service to life. Vocational service is the essence of Rotary and serves as the foundation from which we serve our communities around the world.

ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

The Rotarian Code of Conduct provides a framework for ethical behavior that all Rotarians can use, together with The Four-Way Test, in their business and professional activities. As part of Rotary's guiding principles and the Avenues of Service, Vocational Service calls on Rotarians to empower others by using their unique skills and expertise to address community needs and help others discover new professional opportunities and interests.

By including men and women from diverse professions and backgrounds, Rotary recognizes the importance of all skills and occupations. A vibrant Rotary club reflects the businesses, organizations, and professions in its community, embracing diversity in experiences and perspectives. Your professional life and vocational service go together. Rotarians have a dual responsibility: to represent their occupations within their club and to exemplify the ideals of Rotary in their places of work.

As leaders in their businesses and professions, Rotarians can advance high ethical standards by setting a positive example among colleagues and in their community. Here are a few specific ways Rotarians integrate ethics into their daily work life:

- Discuss and emphasize honesty, accountability, fairness, integrity, and respect when hiring, training, and supervising employees.
- Praise and encourage the exemplary behavior of colleagues.
- Demonstrate personal commitment to high ethical standards in relations with customers, vendors, and business associates, treating each business interaction with care and consideration.
- Promote socially and environmentally responsible practices in your businesses and organizations.

Multi-Year Planning Action Plan Launched - you can help!

District 6110 Multi-Year Planning Action Plan Launched and Underway

Under the leadership of District Governor Pam and Past District Governor Cathy Webster, Rotarians from across our district met in Bartlesville in October, 2022, I for a Multi-Year

Planning Kick Off Meeting. The session was facilitated by our then Rotary International Zone Director Elizabeth Usovicz.

As a first step, we explored our <u>Rotary</u> <u>International Action Plan</u> and how these priorities were relevant to our district and clubs. Our global Rotary Action Plan priorities are:

- Increase Our Impact
- Expand Our Outreach
- Enhance Participant Engagement
- Increase Our Ability to Adapt



During this brainstorming session we identified many things we do well â€" RYLA, Polio and Foundation giving, Club leadership training, dedicated district leaders, among others. At the same time, we examined concerns such as our membership stagnation, district leadership biased toward older and/retiree governors, district conference costs and content, the disconnect with Rotaract (which is now a fully part of Rotary) and outdated provisions in our Manual of Procedure which governs our district.



We also came up with many great ideas to increase district conference accessibility and appeal, elevate younger members into leadership earlier, better integrate our Rotaract and Interact members, and expand and increase the diversity of our club membership.

Through a prioritization exercise, we set up 5 work groups to tackle the following:

Membership Diversity: Actively Seek out People with Different Lived Experiences

- District Governor Engagement: Review How District Governors Connect with Clubs and Pilot New Models Such as Regional Meetings
- District Conference: Rethink Our District Conference and Include Family-Friendly Activities
- Rotaract / Interact: Training and Education for Rotaract and Interact and Elevate Their Leadership
- District Governance: Update Rotary District 6110 Manual of Procedure

An Action now well underway is the revision of our District 6110 Manual of Procedure led by Past District Governor Danny Mitchell and Broken Arrow Rotarian Roy Wood. They have put several months of work into developing a draft Manual of Procedure updating our governance aligned with Rotary International policy and processes. They will be sharing their work with our membership in the new year.

My Rotary moment came not long after I joined the Rotary in 2004. An Indian Ocean tsunami hit many countries in the region, and I saw the destruction in my home country of Sri Lanka. Those who looked like me were suffering after the event if they were not dead. Many experts predicted that thousands of others would die during the aftermath due to diseases. I have never felt

helpless in my life to the extent I felt just after the Tsunami.

I became a real Rotarian and started collecting funds to help Sri Lanka. Our club sent over \$7,000 to rebuild a school in one of the worst affected areas. Not many died after the tsunami due to diseases caused by the tsunami and a year later it was hard to see the destruction due to the human spirit of helping others. I met many Rotarians who are not members of any Rotary clubs while collecting funds in our community!
