My last newsletter as District Governor…I still remember writing the first one and how many ideas were flying around my head that I hoped to share. I think Iâ€[™]ve hit a lot of them and then even more, since adaptability is key to Rotary and being the District Governor.

First, I need to thank everyone in a leadership position for the District. The Assistant Governors and the Coordinators made sure every club was ready to welcome me during the first six months of the year. Now, I have to remember to tell them I'm making "fun†visits back to clubs! Club Presidents â€`` you made me feel so welcome, and one of the best things this year was an invitation to come back (or a wholehearted welcome when I said I wanted to come back). The last 2 weeks of the year are filled with the opportunity to go back out and induct the Magic Year Presidents…I can't wait.

Second, I am so proud of our District at the District level. We are very close to getting Zone level awards for our Foundation giving and our Public Image updates. We will know in Huntsville how our District stacks up at the September Zone Institute.

And in terms of our 3-year vision for the District, established in October 2022, we are making progress. We have 20 Interact Clubs (target was 22 â€" can we be at 30 by next June?). Interact, along with Rotaract, Rotary Youth Exchange, and Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) all increase our impact with young people. We updated and approved a new Manual of Procedures and Incorporation documents. This increases our ability to adapt. We had a spring District Conference. We had a few regional meetings. This expands our reach, increases member engagement, and shows our adaptability. We still have some things to do before we make a final review of our plan in October 2025; you aren't getting rid of me as DGE Warren has asked me to continue to work with our strategy champions to ensure we keep moving forward.

DGE Warren and I were honored to present on behalf of District 6110 (plus District 6150 and Zone 30-31) our 3 year plan. Past RI Director Elizabeth Usovicz invited us to join her in a breakout session. Due to unforeseen events, Warren and I were the only ones on the stage in Singapore. And I believe we helped the larger Rotary world understand how a three-year plan aids in the continuity between each District Governor. District 6110 was fortunate to have its Governor Line in Singapore: iPDG Cathy Webster, DG Pam Crawford, DGE Warren Lovinger, DGN John Rains, and DGND Laura Garrett. We all understand the direction and interests of Rotary International to talk to the District and to all our wonderful clubs.



Our Wonderful Clubsâ \in every PDG told me that meeting you, the heart of Rotary, would be the highlight of this year. And they were right. Seeing what each of your clubs do to help your community made my heart swell with pride at how we work to empower our youthâ \in and polioâ \in take on the root issues of peaceâ \in take care of ourselves as a first step in mental health awareness.

Miami Club Completes Its Water Project

The Miami, OK Rotary Club has completed its water project at the Chahafi Health Center in Kisoro, Uganda. The project began when I went to the Rotary International convention in June, 2022 in Houston and had a chance to meet Jenifer Aporo from Uganda. Jennifer is president of the Inner Wheel Club in Kampala, Uganda. Our club was able to partner with her club to provide two water-harvest tanks for a health facility.

Some facts on Uganda: 45 million people do not have access to clean water. Only 20 percent have access to handwashing facilities. 70 percent of all treatable diseases stem from the lack of clean water. Hopefully, we were able to make a ripple of an impact by providing some clean water to a very important facility.

WHAT'S THIS ALL ABOUT? Although RI and Inner Wheel share some of the same service goals, they are separate organizations and have no official affiliation. Inner Wheel was founded in 1924 by Margarette Golding, a nurse, businesswoman and the wife of a Manchester, England Rotarian, to unite wives and daughters of Rotarians (who were prohibited then from membership). The Rotary General Secretary maintains an agreement with International Inner Wheel concerning its emblem, which certainly is similar to the legacy Rotary logo.

Dear District 6110 Rotarians and Rotaractors,

Please make your 2023-2024 Rotary Foundation **Annual Fund SHARE** and/or PolioPlus **donations now** either by mail or by donating online by logging in to Rotary.org or go to **Rotary.org/donate.** The mail runs very slowly and we want your donations to count toward your clubâ€[™]s per capita giving for this year.

District Grants are awarded first to those clubs with \$100 or more per capita giving to the Annual Fund SHARE - so make it count! The Rotary Foundation is the engine that makes Rotary work. One-half of the Annual Fund SHARE donations from our district come back in three years to help fund District Grants to clubs, Global Grants, and other projects.

For those clubs who have completed their 2023-2024 projects, please finalize the reports and upload needed documents (canceled checks, invoices, photos of the project in action, etc.) so we can send your club a check. New grant applications begin July 1, 2024. The district match this time will be 2 to 1 for up to a total of \$3000 per club. For example, if the projectâ€[™]s total cost is \$600, you would receive a reimbursement check of \$400 from the District. I hope you are planning

your future projects now. I look forward to seeing what our amazing clubs are doing in their communities and beyond!
