Tulsa Rotary Club's Rotary Plaza

The Tulsa Rotary Club recently conducted its Plaza Work Day. The Rotary Plaza committee is responsible for the ongoing upkeep of the club's \$1 million gift of public art that was presented to the citizens of Tulsa as the club's centennial project.

Rotary Plaza on Williams Center Green is located between Tulsa's Performing Arts Center and the Hyatt Regency Hotel. It is a huge public art installation of a central globe surrounded by 4 sculptures on descriptive pedestals, ringed by black granite panels engraved with the words "Celebrating a Centennial of Service, Tulsa Rotary Club 1915-2015," Rotary Plaza is a strikingly beautiful, welcoming, pedestrian-friendly addition to Williams Green.

The sculptures were created by noted Tulsa artists Jay O'Meilia and David Nunneley. Each of the individual bronzes sit on a granite pedestal that is inscribed with a message about the sculptures.

The Bixby Rotary BBQ 'n Blues Festival Reminder - get these dates on your calendar.


All events will be held at Washington Irving Park, 137th and Memorial Drive.


Bristow Rotary Club Recycles

Proceeds from the event are used for college scholarships and dictionaries, etc.



What is Rotary's website all about?

ROTARY.ORG AND MY ROTARY

Rotary.org is primarily for the public, program participants, and other nonmembers. It describes our programs and initiatives and also includes content of interest to members, like the latest Rotary news and online giving opportunities.

Rotary's official website for members, My Rotary, offers information about membership, scholarships, Rotary events, and stories of Rotary service and other activities all over the globe.



When you register for a My Rotary account, you gain access to a variety of resources:

- **Brand Center** Find messaging and visual guidelines along with customizable materials you can use to promote your club, projects, and programs. Are you using outdated logos? Here's where you can make your club's own up-to-date logo!
- **Club Finder** Whether you're traveling across town or around the globe, find a club to visit. It's a hoot to visit another club while on vacation or traveling on business.
- Learning Center Take online courses about Rotary and professional development topics.

- Rotary Club Central See your Rotary club's profile and goals. This is where you enter your Foundation goal, your membership goal, etc.
- The Rotary Foundation See your giving history, make a donation, set up Rotary Direct.

With your My Rotary account, you can also register for international events and network with other professionals. To learn how to get one, download How to Create a My Rotary Account. March is Water and Sanitation Month

Rotary's focus in March is Water and Sanitation.

Over 750 million people in the world lack access to safe water and more than 2.5 billion

people lack access to adequate sanitation facilities. Here's more: CDC Facts

Clean water is a basic need for human beings. When people, especially children, have access to clean water, they live healthier and more productive lives. However, at least 3,000 children die each day from diseases caused by unsafe water, which is what motivates our members to build wells, install rainwater harvesting systems, and teach community members how to maintain new infrastructure.



While very few people die of thirst, millions die from preventable waterborne diseases, providing the impetus for our members to also improve sanitation facilities in undeveloped countries. Members start by providing toilets and latrines that flush into a sewer or safe enclosure and then add education programs to promote hand-washing and other good hygiene habits.

When people have access to clean water and sanitation, waterborne diseases decrease, children stay healthier and attend school more regularly, and mothers can spend less time carrying water and more time helping their families.

Several District 6110 clubs have helped with international projects!

This is a problem right here in the USA: there are 489,836 households lacking complete plumbing, 1,165 community water systems with Safe Drinking Water Act Serious Violation, and 21,035 Clean Water Act permittees in Significant Noncompliance. And don't forget Flint, Michigan.

Through water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) programs, Rotary's people of action mobilize resources, form partnerships, and invest in infrastructure and training that yields long-term change. <u>CLICK HERE FOR MORE INFORMATION</u>
