Hello…I'm just back from the Wheelchair Mission in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico. (See story and photos later in the newsletter) And my thoughts about the relationships we create in Rotary are what I want to share.

I first had this thought a few weeks ago as I was leaving the Broken Arrow Trivia fundraiser. I had put together a trivia team from the District Governor line $\hat{a} \in iPDG$ Cathy, DG Pam, DGN John and his partner Cathy, and DGND Laura $\hat{a} \in The G Line$. We were pleasantly surprised to come in third overall, and second in the Civic Groups category behind $\hat{a} \in (drumroll please!)$ Tulsa Sunrise Rotary Club!!! We had no clue how we would perform. And we had no clue how much we

would enjoy exercising the 5th Test â€" Is It Fun! BUT back to relationships. As some of us left the building on the Northeastern State University Broken Arrow campus, we were saying goodbye and telling each other to drive safely to (cue The Waltons and good-night John Boy) Bartlesville, Claremore, Muskogee, Pryor and Sapulpa. One of the very best things about Rotary is having friends from so many places! And when we come together to support a community, we Increase Our Impact!

This sense of relationship caught me again the last four days. Of course, there were the five people from Tahlequah that waited, as I did, for storms to pass by DFW so we could get to Mexico. To be part of 37 Rotarians, friends, and family delivering wheelchairs to adults in need provided some incredible moments of Hopeâ \in of Magicâ \in of Service Above Selfâ \in of People of Action. The fun together at meals and at the hotel was what makes this mission trip so special. Weâ \in we shared a common experience. And we Expand Our Reach by inviting our friends and family to join the fun and the service. Congratulations to Noel Morris and the **Springdale Rotary Club** for expanding this project to all of District 6110.

Those relationships took a different meaning this weekend as I talked about aspects of the District Conference with people. I was excited to have idea exchanges on how to make it a great conference. Maybe we have a new, better idea for the time slot allocated to a service project. Excitement that we are bringing back the 4-Way Test Speech Contest. Ideas for raising more funds for polio and for wheelchairs were discussed.

And ALSO the eradication of polio and the wheelchair mission intersected! My 2017 Rotary Moment was supplemented with a 2024 Rotary Moment…both on polio. On Saturday, March 9, we gave chairs to two women who had polio as children. For varying reasons, their families had not had them vaccinated. One had polio in about 1968. Her left leg is useless. Because of that, her right hip constantly hurts and so a wheelchair is vital. We interviewed her to add to the wheelchair mission video that is typically created. She was a survivor full of grace and hope...a single mom, a real estate agent, a person doing good within the constraints of a lingering disease.



The other woman (left) had polio when she was eight in 1988, two years before Mexico eradicated polio. AG Michelle and her daughter Julie (Van Buren) gave her a chair. When I heard she had had polio, I joined them to have the translator ask more questions.

We are so close. It has been 4 or 5 months since a case has been registered in Afghanistan or Pakistan. We will be emphasizing eradication of this terrible disease at the District Conference. We still have a lot of clubs that haven't supported the End Polio Now campaign. It isn't too late!

Lots of details are coming about the District Conference, May 3-4 in Rogers, AR, over the next few weeks. Please join to build a better appreciation for all that Rotary does in the

world and to build new relationships and strengthen old ones.



Mexico Wheelchair Project

Twenty-one years ago, the Springdale Rotary Club and Noel Morris made their first

Wheelchair mission. It was to DIVAC Handicapped Services in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico. On March 7-11, District 6110 returned with wheelchairs to support nearly 100 adults and a few children with chairs. Some 37 Rotarians, family, and friends from District 6110, and all four states were represented. It was the 20th trip by District Rotarians (2021 was missed due to COVID-19).

DIVAC is a non-profit organization created by people with disabilities in 1998 with the purpose of helping full integration into our society.

March 8 and 9 were spent delivering chairs at the DIVAC building, and enjoying lunch together hosted by a Puerto Vallarta Rotarian at his restaurant, *Andale*. When not busy, Rotarians exercised the Fifth Test by enjoying time together getting to know each other. One of the best parts of this trip is getting to know Rotarians from other clubs in our district!

This trip is a great way to experience an international mission trip. It is Service Above Self and It Is Fun!

It is amazing to think of the lives we have changed over more than 20 years by the gift of a simple \$150 wheelchair. Noel Morris of the Springdale Rotary Club continues at the helm of these trips through the American Wheelchair Mission.

The delivery of a wheelchair to a person without mobility improves the quality of life for the entire family. Children can go to school; adults can go to work to provide for their families and the elderly can get out of a bed they may have stayed in for years at a time. We estimate that each wheelchair we deliver impacts an average of 10 lives in a positive way. People of Action make that happen! Plan to join us in the spring of 2025.

Broken Arrow Rotary's Crowing Rights Trivia Contest

This special fundraiser was established in 2008. As a new club member, I suggested the idea after being inspired by a successful event organized by Cathy Webster from the **Pryor Rotary Club.** The **Broken Arrow Rotary Club** board entrusted me to bring it to life!

Despite my lack of experience in organizing such events, Cathy graciously shared her knowledge and resources, and our club members eagerly joined in to launch our first competition in 2009. We host our annual event at Northeastern State University-Broken Arrow, a loyal supporter providing excellent facilities and refreshments in exchange for one team entry. The multiple choice question format covers a wide range of topics, making it beneficial to include multiple ages and interests on each five-member team, which costs \$400.

Since 2012, we have used half of the funds raised to support <u>Happy Hands Education Center</u>, a school that serves young children with hearing-impairments and other communication challenges. The other half of our proceeds goes towards scholarships for seniors at Broken Arrow High School. Since 2009, we have raised over \$90,000!

We chose late February for the contest to avoid the holiday rush of December and precede the business of spring. The 2020 contest was held just before the COVID shutdown, but in 2021, we moved the contest online, and it surpassed our expectations! Each year, we've refined the event for more fun and success. We even organized a mini-contest in January for our club to generate excitement among volunteers and introduce new members to the contest format.

The winning team earns our coveted traveling trophy - a proud golden rooster (a playful reference to the Rooster Days Festival in Broken Arrow). The team names are engraved on a brass plaque and added to the names of past champions. The winner gets to display the Crowing Rights Rooster trophy for the year. Other high-scoring teams have the opportunity to win category trophies for non-profits, businesses, civic groups, etc. Our club members support non-profit teams for that category, including the Broken Arrow Police, Gatesway Foundation, and others. The business category includes banks, insurance companies and more. The education category has drawn entries ranging from pre-school to university-level teams.



This year's contest continued our 15-year legacy of triumphs with 20 teams competing. We were especially pleased to have a strong Rotary presence this year, including "The G Line," made up of past, present, and future District Governors, **Rotary Club of Tulsa Sunrise** (the 2022 event winners), **Rotary Club of North Tulsa, Rotary Club of Tulsa, and The Rotary Club of Pryor**. The winning team this year was sponsored by Russell Peterson, a committed Broken Arrow Rotarian with a grandchild at the Happy Hands school.

Multi-Year Planning Action Plan Launched - you can help!

District 6110 Multi-Year Planning Action Plan Launched and Underway

Under the leadership of District Governor Pam and Past District Governor Cathy Webster, Rotarians from across our district met in Bartlesville last fall for a Multi-Year Planning Kick Off Meeting. The session was facilitated by our then Rotary International Zone Director Elizabeth Usovicz.

As a first step, we explored our <u>Rotary International Action Plan</u> and how these priorities were relevant to our district and clubs. Our global Rotary Action Plan priorities are:

- Increase Our Impact
- Expand Our Outreach
- Enhance Participant Engagement
- Increase Our Ability to Adapt

During this brainstorming session we identified many things we do well â€" RYLA, Polio and Foundation giving, Club leadership training, dedicated district leaders, among others. At the same time, we examined concerns such as our membership stagnation, district leadership biased toward older and/retiree governors, district conference costs and content, the disconnect with Rotaract (which is now a fully part of Rotary) and outdated provisions in our Manual of Procedure which governs our district.

We also came up with many great ideas to increase district conference accessibility and appeal, elevate younger members into leadership earlier, better integrate our Rotaract and Interact members, and expand and increase the diversity of our club membership.

Through a prioritization exercise, we set up 5 work groups to tackle the following:

- Membership Diversity: Actively Seek out People with Different Lived Experiences
- District Governor Engagement: Review How District Governors Connect with Clubs and Pilot New Models Such as Regional Meetings
- District Conference: Rethink Our District Conference and Include Family-Friendly Activities
- Rotaract / Interact: Training and Education for Rotaract and Interact and Elevate Their Leadership
- District Governance: Update Rotary District 6110 Manual of Procedure

An Action now well underway is the revision of our District 6110 Manual of Procedure led by Past District Governor Danny Mitchell and Broken Arrow Rotarian Roy Wood. They have put several months of work into developing a draft Manual of Procedure updating our governance aligned with Rotary International policy and processes. They will be sharing their work with our membership in the new year.
