





-Ask every member which club **committee** they want to be on next year and follow through.

Council on Legislation makes changes to Rotary Operations

Every three years, Rotary International convenes a "Council on Legislation" to review possible changes in the operation of the organization. Delegates are seated ar One Rotary Center, our headquarters in Evanston, Illinois from every District and review dozens of options that have bene forwarded from Rotary Clubs and Districts.

Past District Governor Rolf Hufnagle represented District

6110 at the COL in April and offers this report:

We had a total of 492 districts represented. There was an additional cadre of approximately 100 people, including translators, Rotary staff, members of the Rotary board of Directors and Council officials.

It began with a Sunday afternoon 3:00 to 6:00 meeting to review the ground rules. All members of the Council had previously attended a Zone COL training session as well taken an online course.

The work began on Monday with 4 sessions, Tuesday 2 sessions, Wednesday 4 sessions and Thursday with 2 sessions. Whew!

We addressed 86 Enactments. Some were easily decided, others took hours.

The ones that caused the most discussion were:

Proposed Enactment 25-49: To increase per capita **dues**. This PASSED after a long discussion, 351/135. RI dues will increase by \$3.50/ year for 2025-2026, and increase by \$3.75 for each of the following two Rotary years.

PE 25-72. Remove the requirement to hold an Annual District Conference, PASSED 252/216.

PE 25-76 to amend PETS to PELS (President-Elect **Training** Seminar to **Learning**). PASSED 254/221, with a provision that each PETS can elect to change or not.

PE 25-07 decrease the number of members to charter a new club from 20 to 15. PASSED 305/177.

There were many enactments that attempted to micro-manage club or district activities. These were turned down. We had a number of Enactments that were withdrawn and postponed.

The whole session was handled as a parliamentary process. Rules were strictly enforced under the Parliamentary rules. Very strictly. This was a very worthwhile set of meetings for any Rotarian. It was very interesting to see how our rules and changes are implemented.

Rotary International President Stephanie A. Urchick set the tone for the Council on the opening day, stressing the cross-cultural and cooperative nature of Rotary.

"This Council represents the heart of Rotary's democratic process and the best of our

international spirit," Urchick said. "The gathering is one of Rotary's most powerful expressions of multiculturalism. Here, voices from every corner of the globe come together – not to compete, but to collaborate."

We have had one Peace Scholar in our District, Bobbie Bigby of Tulsa. She was a Rotary Peace Fellow in 2014-2015. She earned her MA in International Studies, Peace and Conflict Resolution at the University of Queensland, Australia in our program. Sadly, as she finished her studies in Australia, she was diagnosed with breast cancer and underwent surgery and treatments. She then came back to Tulsa and worked with refugees from Myanmar.

District 6110 was an original Peacebuilder District and helped to endow the program. Peacebuilder Clubs are a Rotarian movement creating energy and momentum for peaceful conflict resolution around the world.

Ty Rossow is a recent Global Grant Scholar sponsored by the Southside Tulsa Rotary Club. You may have seen our talk with him during the 2024 District Conference. And we are currently in the process of working on another Global Grant Scholar.

Giving to The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund (Share) allows us to fund many scholarships and other educational opportunities in our District. Our input of funds has an output of educated young people to be our leaders of the future...impact and outcome. It is not too late to make a gift for the 2024-2025 Rotary year...even a little bit goes a long way!

Legacy Campaign Smashes thru goal at finish!

Governor Warren noted the final goal-smashing figure for the Legacy Campaign of \$3,375,000 in his column above. This is a wonderful and significant increase beyond the original \$2,000,000 goal.

Here's a bit more info on this permanent addition to the Rotary Foundation and how it will help District 6110:

New Legacy Campaign Giving by state:

- Arkansas \$1,470,306 (43.5%)
- Oklahoma \$1,180,492 (35.0%)
- Missouri \$606,896 (18.0%)
- Kansas \$117,306 (3.5%).

The final total of \$3,375,000 includes:

- \$986,000 (29.2% of total) as Major Gift (cash) donations from 12 Rotarians and spouses and
- \$2,389,000 (70.8% of total) as bequest donations from 32 Rotarians and spouses.

The vast majority of the gifts and bequests were assigned by donors to "TRF Endowment - Share". Though it will be years before all the bequests will be paid (at the passing of the donors), the Endowment will eventually be returning 3% of the donated total ($\$3,375,000 \times 0.03 = \$101,250$)

to District 6110 annually forever as District Designated Funds (DDF) that we will be able to

distribute to our D6110 Rotary Clubs and our international participation projects.

Now THAT is a legacy of which we can all be proud!

These figures add to the permanent Endowment giving by many Rotarians prior to the Legacy Campaign both in bequests and cash gifts.
