Hello Friends!

I continue to so enjoy visiting your clubs. And this month I'm also getting a few service and social events added to the mix.

I want us to look ahead to November and Foundation Month. I hope you are closing out your district grants for 2022-2023, and also getting your request in for 2023-2024. Both actions are due by **November 30, 2023**.

In particular, I want to talk about Global Grants this month. We have several grants related to water on our list. One special one is the John Broderick Memorial Water Conservation Project in Pune, India (sponsored by the Springdale Club). What a nice way to honor the memory of one of our Past District Governors. We have another one we are working on that includes the Iola Club and will help with



water in Nicaragua. This project will honor the memory of Tom Brigham (partner of PDG Judy Brigham). And there are several others on the list.

One of our recent grants was a scholarship for a young man to study in England. Tyler (Ty) Rossow of Tulsa received a Rotary Foundation Global Grant Scholarship in the area of Economic and Community Development. Global Grant Scholarships replaced Ambassadorial Scholarships a number of years ago. This is the first scholarship recipient from our District under the new program. Ty's scholarship is sponsored in our district by The Rotary Club of Southside Tulsa. See the whole article in the September newsletter





on this special global grant. We talk so much about our grants that support projects outside of our district.

I recently had the opportunity to see the results of a Global Grant that supported a project **inside** our District - the Will Norton Miracle Field in Joplin. The Rotary World responded when Joplin was hit by a EF-5 tornado in May, 2011. So much response, that there was a realization that a project of lasting value was needed - a field for special-needs children and adults to play baseball. The project included a \$200,000 global grant, named for a Joplin RYLA student who perished in the tornado. There is also a playground by the field that is accessible. If you get to Joplin, the Miracle Field and its story

should be a stop (and so should the <u>Joplin Rotary Sculpture Garden - newest</u> addition "Strength and Courage" at right).

Please consider a gift to The Rotary Foundation's annual fund; the



annual fund is how we receive money to support district grants, global grants, special gifts like the \$5,000 we just sent to Morocco in response to their earthquake, and so forth.

We also support the End Polio campaign from our District Designated Funds that are based on our giving to the annual fund. Our District Foundation Committee is ready and willing to help you understand the value of The Rotary Foundation!

And there is still time (October 31) to sign up for Rotary Direct to get some matching points toward a Paul Harris Fellow award. (First time sign-up, up to 500 points.)






Polio Eradication – The End is in Sight

For the past four decades, Rotary International and its Foundation, along with the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, in cooperation with the Global Polio Eradication Initiative and the World Health Organization have been working to eliminate the wild polio virus from the

world and to make the entire world polio-free. The upcoming World Polio Day (on October 24th) is a great time to reflect on how far we have come and how close we are to eradicating this dreaded disease.

Some Rotarians who are still living today will remember the horror of the 1950's when the wild polio virus wreaked fear on our own society. Even into the 1980's, polio was still killing and crippling children around the world. In the late 1970's, Rotarian Ben Saltzman, from the Rotary Club of



Mountain Home, led an immunization team to the Philippines to administer a two-dose polio vaccine to children.

After two years, more than six million children in the Philippines had received both doses of the oral polio vaccine. The success of this project led to Rotary International's Polio Plus Initiative – created in 1985. At that time, there were nearly 1,000 new cases of polio in the world EVERY DAY. Today, there are only 8 reported cases this year in two remaining countries - Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Through Rotary International, its Foundation and partner organizations, over 2.5 billion children have been vaccinated against polio. It is estimated that 20 million children are



walking today from receiving this vaccine. Since 1988, there has been a **99.9 percent reduction** in polio cases worldwide.

As we know from the recent COVID-19 epidemic, viruses can readily mutate and become even more virulent in their infectivity, so the eradication of polio virus remains the goal. Even excreted vaccine virus "can mutate back to a more virulent, transmissible version and cause paralysis and outbreaks" (from *Global Outlook – A Rotarian's Guide to The Race to End Polio*).

When the Global Polio Eradication Initiative was started by the World Health Organization in 1988, there were 125 polio-endemic countries with a total of 350,000 new cases of polio per year. By the year 2000, those numbers had shrunk to only 20 polio-endemic countries with 719 new cases per year. Today, wild polio virus is only endemic in 2 countries.

Experts agree that "if we choose to control polio rather than eradicate it, more than 10 million children under the age of five could be paralyzed by the disease in the next 40 years". This catastrophe for these 10 million children can be avoided by eradicating this virus from the world – once and for all.

Rotarians around the world are encouraged to become active in the eradication efforts to rid

the world of polio permanently. <u>World Polio Day</u> is a great time to renew our efforts to raise funds needed for this final push towards eradication of this dreaded virus.



In *Global Outlook – a Rotarian's Guide to Advocacy for Polio Eradication*, the following statements are very powerful: "the world is 99 percent polio-free. We are closer than ever to ending the crippling disease for good, yet we are in emergency mode. We don't have the funding to finish the job. It's up to everyone to make sure polio stays on the global agenda Together, we will cross the finish line and leave a legacy of a polio-free world."

I encourage you and your clubs to join us in raising money for World Polio Day 2023.
