

### On the Road with Governor Warren Lovinger

As we approach World Polio Day on October 24th, it is important to discuss this once common disease, the effort to eradicate it, and Rotary International's key role in the process.

Poliomyelitis is caused by a virus that attacks the nerve cells of the spinal cord. It is spread orally in contaminated water, food, or through direct contact. It usually affects young children, but adults are also susceptible (e.g. President Franklin Roosevelt). Of those who become ill, 10% die, while 65% of survivors are left with varying degrees of paralysis.

By 1955, epidemics of Polio were causing panic in the United States and elsewhere. A vaccine became available at that time, created by Dr Jonas Salk. He became a national hero. Most Americans over the age of 70 remember getting their first "polio shot" then. In 1961, an "oral vaccine" (often given on a sugar cube) was introduced by Dr Albert Sabin. It was easier to give, and thus became the preferred vaccination method internationally. Within a few years, acute Poliomyelitis had been eliminated in the U.S., though there are still many "polio survivors" among us. In 1985, Rotary International courageously proposed a vaccination project for children worldwide, as 385,000 cases were still occurring each year. In 1988, this challenging project began, in partnership with UNICEF, the World Health Organization, and The Gates Foundation.



Through the determined efforts of thousands of vaccination workers, steady progress has occurred over the last 36 years, with polio now 99.99% eradicated worldwide! Only a small border area of Afghanistan and Pakistan still harbors the wild poliovirus (20 cases to date in 2024), and vaccination efforts continue there, under very difficult conditions. This disease could again spread elsewhere if we don't "complete the process" of eliminating it through worldwide vaccination. Of course, this all requires a lot of ongoing financial support. I am very proud that District 6110's Rotary Clubs and members continue to be generous supporters of the Polio Plus project. A heartfelt thanks to all of you!



need in their community.

Who can nominate: Club president

Nomination period: all year

The Significant Service Award is designed to give districts an opportunity to recognize club projects that address a significant problem or need in the local community. (International service projects are not eligible for this award).

As club president, you can nominate your club via an online form to be recognized for a significant service project that addressed a need in your community. You will be asked to provide details about your club's project, including the need that it addressed, its beneficiaries, how many club members participated and benefitted, whether it can be replicated, and how it enhanced Rotary's public image in your community.

When completed, you will receive a copy of your nomination form. A copy will also be sent to your governor for evaluation and consideration. Governors will determine whether to recognize the club and project, and if selected, they will present your club with a certificate of achievement.

#### THE CLOCK IS TICKING BUT THERE'S TIME TO PARTICIPATE

4-Way Test Speech Contest By Chairman Ron Petersen, Sr Rotary has always helped young people. This scholarship contest is open to all young men & women in grades 9 to 12 in public, private and parochial schools and the home schooled.

If your Club isn't involved in the Four Way Test Speech Contest, there is time to get going. MAKE YOUR GOAL NOW. Contact your local people NOW and get rolling to have your club contest completed no later than **January 31<sup>st</sup>**, **2025**. To be included in the competition at the district's semi-final level, you need to provide a thumb drive with a video of your final club winner by the end of February.

MY GOAL: I'm here to ask more Clubs in our District to participate.

- For many clubs, the contest has become an annual project that brings the principles of Rotary to the youth and into homes and schools. Decide now to be your club's kingpin in a club project to teach both business and personal ethics and reward them for the cool way they expressed those principles, AND if they are good enough, they could win "serious" money to help them further their education.
- Suppose the project would be a popular club program and the highlight of every year. The cost is minimal. Prize money for your local students normally ranges from \$100 to \$500. After a process of elimination four finalists in the district will give their speeches live at the District Conference Luncheon May 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2025 for prize money up to \$1,000.
- The speech contest is an opportunity for educators to provide an ethical learning opportunity to young people. Students in participating classes should be asked to write a short essay on the subject: "What the Rotary Four Way Test Means to Me" that can be read in six minutes to their entire class.
- It is essential that students are not limited in their choice of topics. Encourage innovation and creativity even if it seems off-the-wall or states a position that might be controversial or held only by a minority. It can be serious, humorous, commonplace or unique.
- The only criterion: At the very beginning of the student's presentation, they must specifically relate to Rotary's Four Way Test to set the stage for their talk.
- After a process of elimination ... Club entries enter the final round held at District Conference this coming May where the final four will deliver their speeches "live" for the money! The winner receives \$1,000. Each Runner-up \$350.
- YouTube video links of final rounds going back several years AND a complete manual are available on our district web site <a href="https://www.rotarydistrict6110.org">www.rotarydistrict6110.org</a> to navigate; point at "Youth Services" then click on Four Way Test Speech Contest. These videos of past winners are great examples to help teachers and students get involved. The manual will help you get going quickly too!


Members of the **Bartlesville Daybreak Rotary Club** spent some time helping out at MSNI recently getting ready for another shipment.

## **Action Plan Champion: Polio**

World Polio Day is October 24, 2024. One of the challenges for us in the United States is to help make it real here since eradication happened so long ago. And yet it is Rotary's #1

external goal, and it has gained us an incredible reputation around the world as a strong, reputable partner.

I get questions on my polio shirts. But all I have to do is remind people of the case in NYC a couple of years ago, or even more recently, the 10 month old baby who contracted polio in the Gaza Strip. In September, Rotary announced a \$500,000 contribution to the World Health Organization (WHO) to help with humanitarian aid in Gaza.

It costs only \$3 to deliver a vaccine...vaccination, stipend for workers, equipment. So, I looked at our District gifts to EndPolioNow at The Rotary Foundation. If you make a

\$100 gift, you have helped 33 children and who knows how many people around them. When a club and its members collectively give \$1,500 they receive a Polio Certificate and help 500 children. We had 13 clubs achieve that in 2023-24...so 6,500 plus children were helped!

The Rotary Action Plan wants us to think about this in terms of input, output,

outcomes, and impact. The "Polio Pets Project" that we ran in Facebook put about \$1500 more into the fund last year. I thought about that project. It created fun. People learned about Rotary. Money went to the Foundation. Children got vaccines. Parents quit worrying about their kids. Fewer crutches and wheelchairs were distributed. And again, District 6110 exercised the Fifth Test – FUN! I challenge you to think about doing an end polio program. It doesn't have to be on October 24; any day is a good day. And don't forget to register it in My Rotary along with setting a goal for Polio Foundation giving...even a small goal helps. Remember: \$3 vaccinates 1 child!

## There's (a lot) More to Rotary

Do you remember the parable of the elephant and some blind people? One touched the

trunk and declared it a thick snake. Another touched the large ears and thought it was a fan, and the third blind person touched the leg and decided it a tree trunk. What we think of Rotary may be similar. We may know pieces of our own club, but not much beyond that. So what? Like the blind folk, we are missing much of what makes Rotary (and the elephant) unique.

How to fix that?

- Top of the list is the <u>District Leadership Academy</u>, a 7-month comprehensive opportunity it just started for this Rotary year.
- Need a more "bite-sized option: The Rotary Learning Center has many courses 15 minutes and longer on all the aspects of Rotary.

Over the next few months we will take a look at it and how it can help you "see" what
