

Last Week's Program -- January 17, 2023

A-State College of Agriculture Continues to Move Forward

Dr. Mickey Latour, Dean of the A-State College of Agriculture, gave our program last week. He began by saying that over the past 100 years, A-State has evolved from a regional school of agricultural instruction to a place where education is still the primary mission, but now it includes an extensive public outreach programming and research activities. Students are prepared by meeting the community and collaborating with farmers and people in the farm industry.

Not only do they receive degrees, but they receive crop certification. They go out in the field and diagnose problems. They have more hands on experience. They are prepared for entry and career



advancement in the food, fiber, and natural resources industry, which involves production (farming), agribusiness and value-added processing, public service and rural leadership; and for entry and advancement in the manufacturing and industrial technology industries.

A-State receives many grants which provide equipment and services where students are trained to work in the ever changing world economy and acquire enhanced marketability for a wide range of careers. For example, the College of Agriculture received a \$500,000 grant to expand and improve the laboratory space devoted to livestock research. A-State will pursue full USDA inspection approval for its processing area. It is a game changer for students, and will greatly enhance their educational experience. The state of the art facility sells meat to the public.

Latour stated that A-State has come a long way from its inception and will continue to evolve so that its students will be prepared for the future.
