Artificial Intelligence in Education

Join us Tuesday, Aug. 22, for a lively discussion on the role and use of artificial intelligence in our high schools. Moderated by Club 99er **Rajesh Chokhani** of <u>BOND.AI</u>, the panel will feature **Nancy Rousseau** of Central High School, Club 99er **Steve Straessle** of Catholic High School and Club 99er **Cherie Labat** of eStem Public Charter Schools. We'll learn how three of our local high schools are using artificial intelligence to enhance the learning experience and how these administrators are managing the challenges AI brings to the classroom.



Moderator **Rajesh Chokhani** is president of <u>BOND.AI</u> in Little Rock and the 2023 chairman of the Little Rock Chamber of Commerce. Rajesh moved to the U.S. from Mumbai, India, in 2007 to establish Welspun Tubular's first factory outside India. During his tenure, he grew the facility to more than 800 acres with 1 million square feet and 1,000 employees. His passion for improving the financial well-being of hard-working individuals led him to pivot from his 28-year career to lead <u>BOND.AI</u>, one of the

top 100 fintech companies in the country, and launch The BOND Network, the world's first network of banks, credit unions, employers and fintech companies.

Nancy Rousseau has been the principal at Little Rock Central High School for 21 years. A lifelong educator and former English teacher, she works tirelessly to ensure that her diverse student body of 2,400+ students receives the best possible education while developing a deeper understanding of the social issues connected to Central High's unique cultural heritage. Central High is the only functioning high school in America within the boundaries of a National Park Historic Site as a result of its connection to the events of 1957 when the Little Rock Nine attempted to integrate the school. One of Nancy's proudest moments came in 2007 when she, along with community leader Virgil Miller, co-chaired the 50th Integration Anniversary Commission for the City of Little Rock.

Catholic High School's Head of School **Steve Straessle** is a 1988 graduate of CHS and has been a teacher there since 1992. In 2005, he took the helm as principal and just this summer moved to the newly established role of Head of School. In this new position, he serves as the voice of the school, while overseeing the school's operations and faculty recruitment and professional development, along with his continued teaching of senior government classes. He and the faculty and staff of CHS remain committed to challenging their students academically while developing the qualities of faith, integrity and duty. Steve was named DAR Social Studies Teacher of the Year in 1995, was a 2010 finalist for Arkansas Business Non-Profit Business Leader of the Year, Arkansas Scholastic Press Association (ASPCA) Administrator of the Year in 2016 and was a member of the inaugural class of the Arkansas Top Influencers by Arkansas Money and Politics magazine in 2020. Steve has also been honored as the Junior Achievement of Arkansas Educator of the Year and listed in Arkansas Business "Arkansas 250," a list of the state's top 250 leaders as noted by the publication. He also writes a bi-weekly human interest column for the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette highlighting the mountains and valleys of life.

Dr. Cherie Labat is Chief Executive Officer of <u>eStem Public Charter Schools</u>. Before coming to Arkansas, Dr. Labat served in various educational roles in Mississippi, including as a teacher, coach, adjunct professor, assistant principal, assistant dean, principal, assistant superintendent and superintendent. An avid writer, she has been published in several publications, including recently in the Wiley Handbook on National Policy for her research on gun violence. She also authored the Cybersecurity Labor Market Analysis for the University of Southern Mississippi in collaboration with a grant from the Department of Defense. As an innovative leader she served on the Mississippi Computer Science Task Force, implementing coding and artificial intelligence. She was an active community member in Mississippi, serving on many boards and committees, including as a Rotarian. Dr. Labat attended Jackson State University of Southern Mississippi and is a graduate of the Harvard Leadership Institute.

The 5th Test: Is It Fun?

President Ghidotti's Power of Fun Tip of the Week

This week, I have been listening to a lot of Brene Brown, and, as you know, Brene is all about talking about vulnerability and why being vulnerable in life leads to a greater purpose, more happiness and better relationships.

Vulnerability also leads to more fun. One of the key things that author Catherine Price talks about in her book, The Power of Fun, is being able to let go and experience the freedom of fun. That often means us letting down our guard, our self-judgment and our inhibitions to be able to experience True Fun.

This vulnerability can often lead to what Price calls playful deviance – basically breaking some rules - but not too much - and behaving in ways that are unexpected, unusual or mildly taboo.

A good example of this is last summer when my bestie group chartered a boat together in the British Virgin Islands to celebrate my husband's 50th birthday. Before we got there, we drew names out of a hat, and each person had to purchase an outfit for the name they drew. Catch was, that person HAD TO WEAR THE OUTFIT no matter where we went that day. As you can imagine, this led to some truly hilarious and True Fun moments as each of us had to wear our outfits to the legendary floating bar, Willy T's.

I'd love to show you a photo of this, but we all had to promise we would never share the evidence beyond our group. Though I'm pretty sure there is a video out there somewhere from the other patrons who were awestruck when we walked onto that boat!

So, we're not talking rebellion that is going to hurt someone or put someone in jail ... it's harmless rebellion in which you deliberately step outside the bounds of your "normal" life and do something different just for the fun of it.

If you look at what has been written about play out there, you will notice a lot of overlap between the deviance that is associated with rebellion and the escape from "normal" life that's associated with play.

If you're reading this and you're thinking ... this sounds irresponsible and indulgent, here's the thing: In the proper doses, responsibility and indulgence (and pushing ourselves out of our comfort zones) are VERY good for us. In fact, they are essential. Having too many responsibilities makes us feel heavy and burdened. Always prioritizing others' needs over ourselves leads to resentment and burnout.

If you haven't picked up the book yet, definitely do so. The chapter on rebellion is really good. She discusses how dopamine - which is a tool our brains use to form

memories and record things that are worth doing again and keep us focused on the present moment – is often fueled by novelty. And rebellion is often about trying new things.

So I'm hopeful a lot of you will work some playful deviance into your lives in the coming weeks. Just please don't go to jail ... UNLESS you are Brad Burleson who we learned in his fun video has a free get-out-of-jail card for the Hot Springs Jailhouse!
