Arkansas' Lithium Rush

Just two days ahead of the Arkansas Lithium Innovation Summit, Rotary Club 99 members will have an opportunity to hear about the significant role lithium is playing in south Arkansas' economic development with a special "Lithium Rush†panel presentation on Tuesday, Feb. 13. Journalist **Roby Brock** will moderate a Q&A with Magnolia's Director of Economic Development, **Ellie Baker**, and **Robert Mintak**, CEO of Standard Lithium, one of the sponsors of the summit.







Roby Brock is the CEO of Talk Business & Politics, a 25-year-old multi-media news organization reporting on business and politics in Arkansas. Under Roby's direction, content is driven through many channels such as the Talk Business & Politics TV show. He is also the host of Capitol View, a Sunday morning political show on KARK Channel 4 in Little Rock and KNWA in northwest Arkansas. Capitol View also airs in the El Dorado/Monroe, La., Texarkana/Shreveport, La., and Harrison/Mountain Home/Springfield, Mo., markets. Roby also moderates radio programs on NPR affiliates statewide and a daily digital newscast at TalkBusiness.net. In partnership with Hendrix College, Talk Business & Politics conducts statewide polling on political and business issues throughout the year. TB&P also reports through a subscription magazine, daily e-newsletters and web reports featuring state business profiles, industry developments and current political discussions. In September 2016, northeast Arkansas Talk Business & Politics, a free monthly newsprint product, was launched.

As the CEO of Standard Lithium, **Robert Mintak**, leads a dynamic team focused on the advanced development of U.S. critical mineral projects in Arkansas and Texas. Leveraging Direct Lithium Extraction technologies, the collective effort ensures projects are adaptable and scalable. Robert fosters a collaborative environment, bridging the gap between his team and local stakeholders, promoting shared success and risk management. His strategy and team-centered approach are pivotal in establishing Standard Lithium as a leading player in the development of a strong U.S. lithium supply chain, reinforcing the company's significant role in driving the sustainable future of U.S. lithium production.

Ellie Baker serves as the Director of Economic Development for Magnolia. As a Columbia County native, Ellie has a profound understanding of the health and welfare of Magnolia's economic climate. She is a 2002 alum of Southern Arkansas University and obtained her Professional Community & Economic Developer certification in 2019. She is a former director of the Magnolia-Columbia County Chamber of Commerce and the Magnolia Blossom Festival. In addition to her duties as economic developer, Baker has led numerous community development and quality-of-life enhancement projects for the city. Her current and previous roles have allowed her opportunities to capitalize on the qualities that are natural and unique to Magnolia. In 2023, Ellie was recognized as the Arkansas Economic Developer of the Year. She is also a recipient of the South Arkansas Women's Network Career Achievement Award, a Paul Harris Fellow and graduate of the Community Development Institute, Jeff Farris Leadership program, and Leadership Magnolia.








The 5th Test: Is It Fun?

President Ghidotti's Power of Fun Tip of the Week: Seeking Delight = Gratitude = Fun

Last week we touched base on Seeking Delight as a powerful tool on your way to finding more joy and fun in our lives. I went ahead and downloaded the Audible version of Ross Gay's "The Book of Delights,†and so far, so good!

What Ross found out over his year of noticing daily delights is that the more he focused on noticing delight, the more he found himself surrounded by it. You can look at Ross' study in delights as a form of gratitude journaling. Ross wrote about engaging his delight radar ... he said, â€celt was more like the development of a delight muscle. Something that implies that the more you study delight, the more delight there is to study. As I continued the project, I felt my life to be more full of delight. Not without sorrow or fear or pain or loss, but more full of delight. I also learned this year that my delight grows - much like love and joy - when I share it.â€

Again - our lives are what we pay attention to. If we train ourselves to notice delights - things that make us laugh or feel grateful for or are just beautiful or amusing - we will feel more positive. Same goes for fun: if we pay more attention to playfulness, connection, and flow, we'II have more fun. On the other hand, if we spend our time-consuming content that makes us anxious and upset. the more anxious and upset we will be.

This is why practices of gratitude have proven to be so effective in boosting our sense of well-being - they offer a structured way to reframe our reactions. Same goes with naming our daily delights – the better attuned we become to everyday delights and the more we actively seek them out, the more likely it will be for one of these delights to cross the line into True Fun.

Two of our guests from last week, LeAnn and Burke Jolly, owners of Jolly Bodies fitness, which was featured in Mandy Richardson's member video last week, reminded me this week of part of the fun journey. LeAnn posted a story on Instagram about leaning into vulnerability in order to have a more fun existence. And she's right - being vulnerable and being our true selves is an important part of The Power of Fun. We have to step out of our comfort zone and maybe lose some of our control; we have to risk emotional exposure.

And focusing on delight helps us achieve some of that vulnerability because it rekindles our inner playful spirit - the part of you that knew how to have fun when you were a kid. Seeking delight coaxes us a little bit further out of our grown-up shell so that we can have some True Fun no matter our age.

So, think about how you can start Seeking Delight in even the smallest of things this week and see where it takes you.
