The number 711 has a very special significance for Rotary. Room 711 of the old Unity Building, formerly located at 127 North Dearborn Street in downtown Chicago, Illinois, USA, was the birthplace of Rotary International. That historic room, which was the office of engineer Gus Loehr, was the location of that first meeting when Paul Harris met with several friends to discuss his new idea of a club for professionals and businessmen.

A few Chicago Rotarians set about to preserve the room and restore it to its 1905 authenticity. For years, Room 711 was preserved as a miniature Rotary museum by Rotarians around the world who voluntarily belonged to and contributed annually to the "Paul Harris 711 Club," which provided funds for leasing, maintenance and preservation. In 1989, the Unity Building was about to be torn down. Members of the 711 Club carefully dismantled the landmark room and placed its contents in storage. There it stayed until 1994, when the recreated Room 711 found a permanent home, and this piece of the Rotary heritage is preserved at the RI World Headquarters in Evanston.

Global Grant 2237796 Breast Cancer Diagnosis, Training and Treatment will provide training for first contact staff, training for women to do self-testing, and supply 1,800 mammography tests in the states of Mexico, Hidalgo, and CMDX (Mexico City). Training will include 150 timely cancer detection training courses for doctors, nurses, midwives, and community leaders, along with printed materials for sharing knowledge. Ultrasound tests, biopsy tests, and medical consultations will also be provided for women who are detected with breast cancer.

Breast cancer is the number one cause of death for women in Mexico, and the poorest communities have the highest rate of mortality. The program serves women age 40 and above who have limited financial means, and every detected patient will save three to six months of waiting time for similar services at public facilities.

District 6170 is partnering with the host club Lindavista (Mexico City area, District 4170) and five other US partner districts to provide these important services for our neighbors in need. This \$98,4447 project includes \$39,523 in matching funds from The Rotary Foundation.


