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Jackson, MS Clean Water Crisis:

Elizabeth Usovicz Rotary International Director, Rotary Zones 30 and 31

Recent flooding has resulted in a crisis of clean water for Jackson's 180,000 residents, pushing the city's already compromised water system to breakdown. The consequences for the education, health and nutrition of children are especially dire. Schools have been closed due to lack of functioning bathrooms and kitchens. Parents struggle to feed their children due to a lack of clean water for cooking. As an immediate measure, the National Guard has set up seven distribution points for distributing limited amounts of bottled water. Many news outlets have reported on the consequences for the city's at-risk populations and children, including this article from Time magazine.

Rotary District Governor in 6820, Mark DiBiase, the District 6820 leadership and Rotary clubs in Jackson are organized to accept contributions and assistance to help citizens, families and children to access clean water. The Rotary Clubs of Jackson and North Jackson are currently working to identify specific projects to

target their help to the community. District 6820 will also apply for a Disaster Response grant through The Rotary Foundation.






Jerry's story -
