Amanda so focus is on helping schools around the State of Wisconsin to install solar energy systems. In addition to reducing our carbon footprint, there are numerous reasons for schools to consider solar energy. These include financial and operational savings, environmental benefits, job creation, and student engagement in environmental education and action. Also, MREA has provided grants for individual school buildings valued at up to \$20,000 per school.

For those skeptics who think Wisconsin isn t sunny enough to support solar energy efforts, Germany has far less average sunlight than Wisconsin. It outperforms in terms of solar generation by more than 6.5 times.

Today, there are about 7,500 schools with solar arrays across the country, representing approximately 5.5% of all schools in the U.S. Almost 10% of all students in the U.S. attend a school with solar energy. While these may seem like minimal numbers, the growth rate has picked up rapidly in the last several years. Schools are ideal consumers because their hours are predictable, with the highest occupancy during the highest sunlight intensity and energy demand. The cost of solar panels and installation has also dramatically decreased over the past decade, making the payback on investment much shorter in duration.

Finally, the solar industry provides many employment opportunities and added jobs at a rate 70% faster than the overall economy between 2015 and 2019. Amanda illustrated the multiple career paths available to those entering the field, even at the entry-level.

Thanks, Amanda, for a most penlightening presentation.
