A Trip Down Memory Lane Bulletin Notes for a Meeting of the Rotary Club of Wauwatosa

Wednesday, April 3, 2024 A rather subdued group of 15 Rotarians gathered on a dreary (weatherwise) spring Wednesday for the fellowship, fraternization, and friendship of Rotary. Club members were happy to recognize two guests today…Mary Niedermann, wife of the amiable Robert Niedermann, and erstwhile club member (and today's guest speaker) Ron Pruhs (Ron's wife Ronni, who is also well known to many club members, was unable to join us today).

True to form, President Bill promptly called the meeting to order at 12:25:52 and proceeded to lead those gathered in the Pledge of Allegiance and the Four Way Test. Robert Niedermann provided today's invocation.

President Bill shared that a few Rotarians celebrate their Rotary anniversaries in early April including Paul Vandeveld on April 2nd, Rick ("Bernieâ€) Steinberg on April 5th, and Robert Niedermann on April 7th. Mr. Niedermann is both the oldest (chronologically) and

longest-tenured club member of this triumvirate (Paul Vandeveld thought he may have a longer tenure in the club, but he couldn $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{T}^m$ t name the year he joined!).

Richie Frenn was especially ebullient today as the start of the Brewers season typically translates into a seasonal upturn in revenues for Bert's Beer and Liquor. Richie also thanked Paul Vandeveld and Ron Pruhs for their patronage and recent purchases.

President Elect Aaron shared that the club received a letter from a Margaret Kvale. Margaret is a first-year medical student at the Medical College of Wisconsin. Recounting a study abroad experience in Austria she had whilst in high school, she was inquiring if our club knew of any opportunities for adults to mentor high school-age students. Aaron will follow up with Demond Means to see if he is aware of any mentorship opportunities. Hopefully, Aaron will also follow up with Margaret as she could be an interesting guest speaker at a future meeting!



Our attention now turned to today's guest speaker, Ron Pruhs. Being a valued and long-time member of our club, Ron required no introduction.

In one sense, Ron's comments today seemed like a classification talk. In a far more important sense, Ron's comments reflected how he (and his wife, Ronni) truly embody the Rotary theme of, "Service above Self.â€

Following his education and training in pediatric and restorative dentistry. Ron became almost immediately involved in mission work as he firmly believed mission work represents a calling, a vocation. He donated his time and skills in many countries over 55 years including Malawi (where Ronni gave birth to the couple's fourth son. The baby was delivered by a cardiologist from Detroit who happened to be volunteering in Malawi at the same time!), Brazil, Uganda, Thailand and the Dominican Republic. However, his longest commitment was in Haiti

where the Pruhses established a dental clinic inside a hospital in 1994.

For decades, the World Health Organization has indicated that dentistry is the #1 healthcare-related need in developing countries. Ron shared that Haiti is really a $\hat{a} \in \infty$ 5th World Country $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{R}$ as it is not developing and has little hope for same. It is a country where a few well-off people dominate the poor. Little or no government, poor educational systems, lack of adequate electrical and plumbing services all combine to make for miserable living conditions. In addition to the lack of natural resources, the spoken language of $\hat{a} \in \infty$ Creole $\hat{a} \in \infty$ contributes to Haiti $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{T}^n$ lack of development. Creole is a version of French that is only spoken and understood in Haiti. The Pruhses learned to speak Creole out of necessity while in Haiti. Today, gangs control Haiti and violence and crime is replete.

In summarizing his 55 years of mission work, Ron noted all six of his and Ronniâ \in TMs sons worked in missions overseas, his family had to deal with exposures to infectious diseases such as malaria and hepatitis, but that the inner sense of peace they felt from helping the poor made every day worth it.

Bob Nelson noted that Haiti and the Dominican Republic share a common border geographically, yet the Dominican Republic is developing economically and receives a great deal of tourism

Ron noted that when the Spanish left the Dominican Republic, they put a government in place. However, when the French left Haiti, they did nothing to help propel Haitiâ \in TMs future including leaving no government in place.

Many people owe a debt of gratitude to Ron and Ronni for leaving the world a better place than they found it. Thank you for sharing your experiences with us, Ron. We genuinely miss having you as a club member.
