Presentation

Rotarian Ken Fisher introduced our speaker, Megan Yankee. Megan is the executive director of the Stulberg International String Competition. The competition is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year.

The "Stulberg" began in 1975 to honor the late Julius Stulberg, a professor of violin at Western Michigan University. He loved sharing music and working with young musicians. His wife, Esther, began the program by endowing a regional competition for aspiring violinists. Pretty soon, "regional" became "national." As the competition enters its 50th year, the competition is international! In fact, over 236 applicants from all over the world sought to play for the judges in Kalamazoo!

The Stulberg's past medalists include internationally known violinists, such as Joshua Bell and Rachel Barton-Pine. The competition helps to identify talent and to teach children how to become performing artists. It even allows them to bring their own music to the life of others. In addition to a cash prize and mentorship from the judges, the gold medal winner will return to perform with the Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra and the Baltimore Chamber Orchestra. The silver medalist will perform with the Western Michigan University Symphony Orchestra.

All participants this year will be judged on an original composition prepared by Lucas Richman in honor of Stulberg's 50th anniversary. That piece will be played in its entirety by the Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra later this year.

Beginning May 16th, there will be twelve semi-finalists and four alternates playing live music in Kalamazoo. The program will be streamed live internationally.
