- We met at Williamstown Township Hall Pavilion at 7:30 am
  President Laska apologized for the lack of coffee

  President Laska started the meeting with a pledge of Allegiance

  Then we had Happy Dollars

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  Then Laska asked Steve Terry to present two spreadsheets

  A summary of Fundraising Income for the last 6 years
  - · A summary of Grant Expenses for the last 6 years
  - A copy was give to each member
- Steve discussed the income sheet first
  - It did not include the Foundation money
    - It showed that the Duck Race was our biggest income getter
    - Over the last 6 years it produced about \$93,700
       The Rockin' Raffle provided \$17,560 in one year

    - The Taste of Williamston for the 4 years it ran gave us \$34,293 There was no Taste the last 2 years
      - The auction part of the Taste went to the Foundation
        - · So donors could claim a tax credit
        - Not shown in these figures
    - Poker has not been done the last 2 years
    - But produced \$28,499 in the 4 years prior to that
    - Grant revenues were \$19,250 in 6 years
    - In total, the revenue for the last 6 years was \$202,211
- Steve didn't break down all the Grant Expenses
- · Everyone there has a copy to look at and see where the money has gone
- The club has recently gone from 32 to 25 members
- If we do less fundraising, we have to do less grant expenses
- · Should we do less fundraising and more service projects?
- From 2017-2020 we moved \$5000 from Community Service account
  - To our Foundation
  - To be able to fund larger scale projects
  - We stopped that in 2021 due to lack of income
    - Should we start that up again
- The \$5000 donated for the Digital Message Board came out of our Foundation • From 2019-2020 we gave \$100/member to Rotary International Foundation
- · Should we start that again
- · We were then broken up into 4 person groups and discussed a few questions
  - What jumps out at you?
  - Should we continue with the fundraisers?
  - If not okay with what we're doing currently, what would we change?
- We discussed the questions in small groups for 15-20 minutes

#### STORY NUMBER TWO

World War II produced many heroes. One such man was Lieutenant Commander Butch O'Hare.

He was a fighter pilot assigned to the aircraft carrier Lexington in the South Pacific.

One day his entire squadron was sent on a mission. After he was airborne, he looked at his fuel gauge and realized that someone had forgotten to

top off his fuel tank.

He would not have enough fuel to complete his mission and get back to his ship.

His flight leader told him to return to the carrier. Reluctantly, he dropped out of formation and headed back to the fleet.

As he was returning to the mother ship, he saw something that turned his blood cold; a squadron of Japanese aircraft was speeding its way toward the American-fleet.

The American fighters were gone on a sortie, and the fleet was all but defenseless. He couldn't reach his squadron and bring them back in time to save the fleet. Nor could he warn the fleet of the approaching danger. There was only one thing to do. He must somehow divert them from the fleet.

Laying aside all thoughts of personal safety, he dove into the formation of Japanese planes. Wing-mounted 50 caliber's blazed as he charged in, attacking one surprised enemy plane and then another. Butch wove in and out of the now broken formation and fired at as many planes as possible until all his ammunition was finally spent.

Undaunted, he continued the assault. He dove at the planes, trying to clip a wing or tail in hopes of damaging as many enemy planes as possible, rendering them unfit to fly.

Finally, the exasperated Japanese squadron took off in another direction.

Deeply relieved, Butch O'Hare and his tattered fighter limped back to the carrier.

Upon arrival, he reported in and related the event surrounding his return. The film from the gun-camera mounted on his plane told the tale. It showed the extent of Butch's daring attempt to protect his fleet. He had, in fact, destroyed five enemy aircraft. This took place on February 20, 1942, and for that action Butch became the Navy's first Ace of W.W.II, and the first Naval Aviator to win the Medal of Honor.

A Year later Butch was killed in aerial combat at the age of 29. His hometown would not allow the memory of this WW II hero to fade, and today, O'Hare airport in Chicago is named in tribute to the courage of this great man.

So, the next time you find yourself at O'Hare International, give some thought to visiting Butch's memorial displaying his statue and his Medal of Honor. It's located between Terminals 1 and 2. SO WHAT DO THESE TWO STORIES HAVE TO DO WITH EACH OTHER?
